
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The Yahrzeit

I am often asked questions about how to mark a Yahrzeit. When is it? What times is the candle supposed to be lit? On what days is the candle lit? What does one say when one lights the Yahrzeit candle? How do we mark the Yahrzeit in shul?

The word, "Yahrzeit", is Yiddish for "a year's time", and marks the anniversary of the death (not the burial) of an immediate family member. The basic customs are lighting a Yahrzeit candle at home, and coming to shul to say the

Mourners' Kaddish.

The Yahrzeit candle, which burns 24 hours, is lit at sundown at the beginning of the Hebrew date that marks the Yahrzeit. Generally one candle is lit per household. Candles can be purchased in most supermarkets. If we have the name on file in the synagogue, we send you a notice of the correct Hebrew date about two weeks before the Yahrzeit. Yahrzeit candles are also lit by many on the days that Yizkor is recited i.e. Yom Kippur, Shemini Atzeret, and the final days of Pesach and Shavuot. There is no specific prayer that is recited when lighting the Yahrzeit candle, but here is a suggestion of what can be said:

"A light from God is a human soul."
(Proverbs 20:27). At this moment of solemn recollection, I call to mind the presence of _____.

May_____'s soul enjoy eternal life, together with the souls of Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel and Leah; Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob; and all righteous women and men. May I be inspired to perform acts of justice and kindness in ______'s memory.

The primary public observance of the Yahrzeit is to come to synagogue and recite the Mourners' Kaddish which can only be said with a minyan. It is traditional to say Kaddish on the day of the Yahrzeit, but because we know that not everyone can make it to morning minyan on a weekday, we also encourage people to mark the Yahrzeit on the closest Shabbat to the Hebrew date. Yahrzeits from the Thursday preceding Shabbat until the following Wednesday can be marked on Shabbat. For those who have memorial plaques in our synagogue lobby, we also place the Yahrzeit plaque under the eternal flame for the week of the Yahrzeit.

WALKING WITH LIFE: FROM WOMB TO TOMB THOUGH JEWISH TEXTS


Monday evenings, November 12, 19 at 8:00 pm in the Family Life Center Instructor: Rabbi Neil Kurshan

Jewish Public Affairs Forum--Understanding Israeli Politics; How do you Run a Country With 13 Parties Represented in the Parliament?


Tuesday evening, November 13th at 8:00 pm in the Family Life Center of HJC Instructor: Ken Bob

Early Childhood News

My father had many talents and gifts, one of which was his ability to tell stories that would either make you laugh, reflect on your inner most thoughts, or motivate you to try new ways of doing things. Many times during the years I was growing up, I would sit and listen to him retell stories about people in the news, personal stories of his childhood and adult life, stories he encountered on his journey as a salesman and tales he found in magazines as simple as the Reader's Digest. It was not only the way he delivered the stories that I most treasured, but it was the message about life that he wanted me to derive from the carefully chosen experiences he recanted.

One of the stories he often told during my childhood was about the scorpion and the turtle—a valuable story pointing out that you cannot always trust someone will behave with your best interest at heart. Here is how the story went.

A turtle was happily swimming along a river when a scorpion hailed it from the shore. A scorpion being a very poor swimmer, asked the turtle to carry him on his back across the river. Are you mad?" exclaimed the turtle. "You'll sting me while I'm swimming and I'll drown."

My dear turtle, "laughed the scorpion, "If I were to sting you, you would drown and I would go down with you, and drown as well. Now where is the logic in that?"

The turtle thought this over, and saw the logic of the scorpion's statement, "You're right!" cried the turtle. "Hop on!" the scorpion climbed aboard and halfway across the river the scorpion gave the turtle a mighty sting. As they both sank to the bottom, the turtle resignedly said: "Do you mind if I ask you something? You said there would be no logic in your stinging me. Why did you do it?" The drowning scorpion sadly replied, "It's my nature."

This story was retold many times throughout my years at home with my parents. When I foolishly trusted people in my life I knew not to trust due to previous behavior, I retold the story to myself so that I could understand the concept that everyone has a nature unto themselves for better or for worse. The story continues to yield great logic to me on how I choose my friends and who I choose to spend my time with each day.

Another story I found in my father's possessions after he passed away was about Andrew Carnegie, the steel magnate.

Andrew Carnegie, a poor immigrant from Scotland, was one of the great business leaders of the early 20th century in America. He is an American success story, rising from bobbin boy and telegraph operator to multi-millionaire steel magnate by the age of 40.

How did he rise so quickly? Besides investing and using new technology wisely, Carnegie surrounded himself with intelligent and successful people-and he knew the value of delegation.

At one point, Carnegie employed forty-three millionaires (quite a feat in the 1930's). When asked how he had managed to attract and hire all of them, Carnegie responded that they weren't millionaires when they began working for him.

He explained further, "Men are developed the same way gold is mined. Several tons of dirt must be moved to get an ounce of gold. But you don't go into the mine looking for dirt," he added." "You go in looking for gold."

That story was how my father chose to live his life. He always looked for the gold in his children, his friends, and all the people he serviced in business and because of this, he grew to bring out the best in everyone he touched. He became a legend in his profession following the advice of Andrew Carnegie, a lesson he passed on to me by retelling the story along my own life journey.

I am sure that all parents have their own personal stories to share with their children or

stories they have heard through their lifetime. Over a period of time, every life story becomes a historical novel. Hearing stories influences our personality and our lifestyles. I feel that a major part of wisdom, personality development, healing and spiritual growth come about from listening to the stories we hear in our lives.

It has been noted by psychologists when children hear stories from parents or other adults, it not only influences the way a child thinks, but it is surely recognized as a vehicle used to shape a child's life. It is a great way to inculcate values and virtues within a child. Storytelling can directly influence the way children think, how children talk, and the way children behave. A good story teller can also boost a child's vocabulary and help them gain control of their language. Children can become more proficient socially and emotionally by the varied tales told to them.

I have treasured the hundreds of stories told to me by my dad in his lifetime, using each one to improve my own moral compass. I hope that the parents at our school develop a repertoire of meaningful narratives to share with their children. "Storytellers, by the very act of telling, communicate a radical learning that changes lives and the world."

Social Action Committee Update

HJC's Social Action Committee has joined with 9 other Long Island synagogues including Dix Hills Jewish Center and South Huntington Jewish Center in a UJA "Hesed" program to serve a worthy cause in the spirit of Tikkun Olam.

The present project is to offer material and emotional support to the Lone Soldiers of the I.D.F. All members of our congregation are encouraged to get involved. Lone Soldiers are young people serving in the Israeli Army who do not have friends or family in Israel.

There was an informal program at South Huntington Jewish Center on October 28, 2012. At that time there were two Lone Soldiers and "Tziki," a man who has established a community center in Jerusalem offering Shabbat meals, companionship, housing help, etc. as speakers. There were materials for Adults and children who wanted to write cards to the soldiers. Refreshments were served.

Congregation involvement is necessary to help our Long Island Jewish Community to work together for this worthy cause. More information to follow. Annual Project Replenish/ Islah Food Drive was given to the Suffolk Y food pantry.

Social Action members sorted through unsold clothing after the Sisterhood Rummage Sale and put some aside for the HIHI guests this winter and also to Manorfield Clothes Closet. Shoes were donated to Soles for Souls for refurbishing. Business clothes were given away for distribution.

I have noticed over the years a diminishing number of people who come to synagogue to say Kaddish. Recitation of the Mouners' Kaddish was traditionally believed to accrue to the benefit of the deceased in the World-to-Come because its recitation reflected parents who had raised their child with a commitment to Jewish observance. We no longer read a Yahrzeit list on Friday nights at services, but rather invite those present to say Kaddish to tell us the name of the person for whom they are saying Kaddish and their relationship to that individual. This has personalized the experience for those present, and we are no longer reading a list of names for whom there is no one to say Kaddish.

For those seeking to personalize the experience of lighting the Yahrzeit candle at home, this Kavanah by Merle Feld can be recited when lighting the Yahrzeit candle:

(On this night of remembrance) I can't call you to say,

"I'm bursting with wonderful news!"

Your arms won't encircle me when I grieve, when I mourn.

You never know now the unexpected achievements, the abiding sorrows.

And yet, as I stand here with this candle, I allow myself some quiet moments,

Until, once again, your face shines in my memory;

Until, once again, I feel you blessing me.

In remembering those we love at the time of a Yahrzeit, we honor their memories, and hopefully we are inspired to live more just and compassionate lives.
