Reimagining HJC

As I write this column at the beginning of August, it is already safe to say that this was not the summer that most of us anticipated. While summer tends to be relatively carefree, many of us spent the month of July glued to the television or computer about the latest news emanating from Israel. We were saddened by the deaths of so many young Israeli soldiers who had their whole lives ahead of them, and we were also saddened by an enemy that forces us to go to war when we only seek to live in peace with our neighbors. On a personal level I did not anticipate sitting shiva for my mother, but I was grateful to all of you who visited me during shiva or extended condolences to me these past weeks. In the end, this turned out to be a summer of challenges—some, such as the war in Israel, well beyond our

ability to solve; others that are fortunately of smaller magnitude and easier to address.

In the life of organizations such as our synagogue, it is important to be able to distinguish those challenges with easy solutions from those that are more difficult to resolve. Dr. Ronald Heifeitz. Director of the Center for Public Leadership at Harvard, distinguishes between two types of challenges faced by any organization—technical challenges and adaptive challenges. A technical challenge is one where we have a problem and someone else has the solution. We are ill; we have an infection; we go to the doctor who says: "Take this antibiotic and you will be cured in ten days."

Adaptive challenges are problems where we are part of the problem and have to change ourselves. We are having chest pains and the doctor says, "I can give you a pill, but what you really need to do is change your lifestyle; you need to eat more healthily, exercise regularly, reduce your weight, and sleep more at night.

For technical problems, there are usually quick fixes that leadership can employ. The synagogue roof is leaking. We go to roofers and get bids; we find a way to pay for the repairs, and the roof gets fixed.

Adaptive challenges are not so easy to solve. They arise because the world is changing

and circumstances are different from what they once were.

I would argue that the primary challenges we face today at HJC are adaptive rather than technical. That is both bad and good news--bad news because there will be no quick fixes and good news because I believe we have a community that is able to adapt to change.

The structure of the synagogue we have today is one that made sense for a synagogue thirty years ago. The Conservative Movement was growing, Jews were moving to Suffolk County and to Huntington. There was a mini baby boom as the generation of baby boomers had their own children who filled our Nursery School and RS classrooms. People still identified denominationally. There were fewer interfaith families. Jews thought communally rather than individually.


This is not the case anymore. We face a different world, and thus we need to think about a different kind of synagogue. How do we create programming appropriate to an institution in which the largest group is no longer those in their thirties and forties but rather those in their fifties and older? How do we think about an institution that needs to educate parents who did not grow up in traditional Jewish homes, but who nevertheless are seeking Jewish knowledge? How do we reach beyond the walls of the synagogue to Jews who make up a far more diverse population than the conventional mother, father and two children?

I believe strongly that we are fortunate to lead a community deeply vested in the future of our synagogue. I believe that we have always been a community open to change as evidenced by the many new initiatives we have undertaken, and the many times we have been on the cutting edge of developments within the Jewish community whether egalitarianism, family education, Friday Night Live or Wise Aging.

We are already beginning to think about the synagogue in some new ways. Joel Wirchin is heading a long range planning committee that is looking at how the synagogue can be restructured to account for the changing realities we face. We are also fortunate this year to be the recipients of a grant from UJA Federation of NY that will allow us to bring the best of the Huntington Jewish Center to venues and cultural centers of Huntington Village as part of an effort to reach out to young interfaith families in the community who may initially feel insecure about crossing the threshold of the synagogue building itself (if you would like to help in the implementation of this imaginative grant, please let Billy Wertheim or me know).

The challenges we face as a synagogue are not unique to us. They are faced by hundreds of synagogues that are embracing alternative structures for revenue, staffing and programming. We will need to consider some different ways of thinking about our synagogue, but I am convinced that working together we can develop new paradigms for this synagogue that will meet the challenges that lie ahead.

I look forward to a year during which we will plan for our future by reimagining an institution that will continue to strengthen each of us in our Jewish lives and that will help to sustain the Jewish community. Alisa and I extend our warmest wishes to the congregation for a Shana Tova—for a sweet and fulfilling New Year.

This past Tisha B'Av was not a good fast day for me. In fact, it was one of my worst. We had a newborn at home, my other two kids were sick, I didn't have work to distract me, and it was hot outside. Pretty rough to not eat or drink for 24 and a half hours. But normally, I like fasting. And as we look forward to Yom Kippur, I'd like to share with you why that is true.

I can't say that I love fasting,

and enjoy is definitely not the right word, but I think there is a reason that fasting is used in so many religious traditions, whether it's fasting on Fridays during lent, or during the daylight hours during Ramadan. Because when you think about it, it's amazing how much time and energy we spend on food.

What's for dinner? What did you have for lunch? I'm hungry, what can I have for a snack? This is delicious; you've got to try this. This looks interesting. Are we going out tonight, or are we bringing in? What's cooking? So many of our thoughts revolve around food. And as people who live without worrying about where our next meal might be coming from, it's easy to take for granted that food will always be around.

According to the Feeding America website, one in six Americans face hunger and in 2012, 49 million Americans lived in food insecure households. While many of us think of hunger as a far away problem (and can remember stories of starving children in Africa or China), hunger is a very real problem right here at home.

But fasting not only helps me think about food in a different light, it also opens up my thoughts and creates space to think about other things. Whereas on a normal day the first thing I might do when walking in the house is to look in the pantry or fridge for something to eat, on Yom Kippur I can't do that: nothing to snack on when I get home from shul, and nothing to eat for breakfast when I wake up in the morning. Many people complain that because of this, they end up spending more time thinking about food and what they would eat if they could. But I believe that harnessing those thoughts are part of what make fasting so meaningful.

Embracing the hunger and using those feelings can help cleanse the spirit and the soul. When you take a moment to examine the liturgy on Yom Kippur, there is some pretty serious work that we are required to do. By removing just one of the elements that constitute the mundane on a regular day, we can help elevate and even transform the day into something much holier.

So even if you are craving a bagel, or pizza, or chocolate milk, you know that you're not going to have it, and instead, can redirect your thoughts to God, to yourself, and trying to lay the foundation for a better and more fulfilling year. I hope everyone has a Shanah Tovah and an easy and meaningful fast.

Early Childhood News by llene Brown



For those of you who don't know me, my name is Ilene Brown, and I am the new director of the Huntington Jewish Center's Early Childhood Center. For me, HJC has always been my home away from home. It has been a source of joy, comfort, and love for 15 years for my family and me.

When I was looking for a preschool for my son, Cameron, at age 3 (now 18 years old), I had the very good fortune to stumble upon HJC. From the moment I entered HJC for a tour of the Early Childhood Center, I felt

energy, warmth, comfort, and excitement. It was so full of life and love and I immediately knew this was the school for my child. Once Cameron was enrolled, I decided to follow in my mother's footsteps and pursue a career in education. I attended NYIT and received my Master's Degree in Education. While I was completing my student teacher tenure in Syosset, I became pregnant with my second child, Lauren.

A year or so later, at Cameron's graduation ceremony, I became extremely emotional. Not just because my son was graduating and had grown so much at HJC, but because I realized I had to leave HJC until my daughter was old enough to attend. I couldn't bear the thought of leaving my second home, so I decided to become a substitute teacher at HJC. This eventually evolved into an assistant teacher's position and the following year I became a lead teacher for a 3 year old class and ran the incredible library program. I taught at HJC for 11 years before I had to leave for personal reasons. I have been gone for 2 years and words cannot express my joy, gratitude, and elation that I have been given the opportunity to return.

Becoming the ECC Director has been a dream of mine for many years as it marries my two passions: education and management. The teachers in the school have all played a part in my children's education. These dedicated, caring, and talented women have made the HJC Early Childhood Center what it is today. My children could not have received a more stellar foundation and education than they did at HJC. My entire family has made lifelong friends from HJC that are irreplaceable.

I look forward to sharing this journey with you and your families, and I wish all of you a happy, healthy New Year. Shana Tova!

Yosef Koreen

Dr. Joseph M. Koreen is one of the oldest longtime members of the Huntington Jewish Center. Joseph was born in Baghdad, Iraq, the eldest of eight children. His father was a jeweler, his mother a homemaker. As a young child,

he attended The American School for Boys, and studied Hebrew at the Yeshiva in the evening. Joseph attended college at the American University of Beirut (AUB) in Lebanon. In 1939, after receiving his BA, he returned to Baghdad and taught chemistry and biology at Shamash Jewish high school. Longing to study medicine, Joseph returned to AUB to attend medical school, despite the fact that it was difficult for Jewish people to be admitted into AUB at the time. Joseph completed his medical studies in 1949, had a one-year residency at the hospital at AUB, which he completed at The Children's Memorial Hospital (McGill University) in Montreal, Canada. He then worked at The Jewish General Hospital in Montreal and The Ottawa Civic Hospital. Joseph met his wife, Grace, in Ottawa. Her parents had emigrated from the Ukraine as small children. She was one of six children. Her father also loved to attend shul! Grace earned her B.A. from McGill University. Grace and Joseph had their first-born daughter, Esther, in Ottawa and moved to East Northport in 1957.

Joseph walked into HJC, then called "The Huntington Hebrew Congregation," on one of his first Shabbats in the area. He was asked if he could read the Torah, and then, "fell in love" with the congregation. Joseph describes himself as the main Torah reader at HJC for approximately forty years. He read Torah during the entire time of Rabbi Lloyd Tennenbaum, Rabbi Tobias Rothenberg, and the first ten years of Rabbi Neil Kurshan. He was also the chairman of the Ritual Committee for approximately thirty years. Joseph describes his greatest achievement in that role, as advocating for the decision to count women in the minyan.

Joseph and Grace raised their family of three daughters and one son in Huntington. Their children attended HJC's Hebrew School, and they had their Bar/Bat Mitzvahs at HJC. The children also attended the Hebrew

Academy of Suffolk County. Two of Joseph's children, Amy and Roger, still live in Huntington. Daughter Joy lives in Queens, and Esther in Toronto. Joseph has 13 grandchildren; and six great-grandchildren who were born and live in Jerusalem. He has been to Israel many times to visit the country and his family. Joseph had three brothers who raised families in Israel. His other siblings raised families in New York, New Jersey, and Florida.

Joseph claims that his "secret" to longevity, and what brought him great joy and satisfaction in life, is his relationship with The Huntington Jewish Center. He fondly recalls that one of the reasons that Grace enjoyed attending HJC was that there was no reserved seating – first come, first seated. Joseph still chants the Ne'ilah song on Yom Kippur. Many people return for Ne'ilah service specifically to hear Dr. Koreen's chanting in the Sephardic trope, and the blessing that he bestows upon the entire congregation. Another memorable contribution that Joseph is proud of are the songs that he composed and sang to HJC's outgoing presidents during their final "roasts."

Joseph is not only a member at HJC, where he attends most Shabbat mornings, but he also now belongs to the Iraqi synagogue in Queens, where he occasionally sees family and friends from Baghdad! To keep himself busy and active, Joseph exercises every morning, and loves to read the news and about new developments in medicine. He uses the computer and stays in touch with his children and grandchildren via email. His musical interests remain religious, as well as classical music. Yosef always enjoyed swimming at the local YMCA with Grace, and then at the Suffolk Y-JCC. He retired from practicing pediatrics about six years ago.

Joseph uses the metaphor of a pomegranate to describe his love for the HJC. Just like the pomegranate that has many individual seeds, so too, does the HJC have many individuals who come together to make a whole (fruit) community.

Joseph was always extremely involved and present at HJC. He enjoyed being part of fundraising and other community events. His living room wall is covered with plaques honoring his many contributions to the community. He has been, and continues to be, an integral part of the HJC community, and his invaluable contributions to the life of the shul are deeply felt and will continue to be for many years into the future.
