The Last Sermon

I recently mentioned to a colleague who retired several years ago that I would be taking leave of my congregation in a year, and thus will be giving my final set of Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur sermons this Fall. My colleague turned to me and said, "This will be a cathartic experience for you. You will be able to say everything you have always wanted to say and get it off your chest without having to worry about the consequences for years to come."

I thought about my colleague's comment, and it did not ring true for me. I have pretty much said what I have wanted to say in my Yamim Noraim sermons over the years. To the best of my knowledge I am harboring no pent-up emotions or any long simmering resentment. I don't feel like I have anything I have to get off my chest. It does not seem to me that in this last year the boundaries for what it is appropriate to address on Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur have changed very

much.

Yet these yet-to-be-born-sermons—I am writing this column in mid-July—do have a different feel to them than my sermons of past years. I am asking myself this year what I want to say that I have not yet said? What will I regret not having said if I don't say it this year? What stories, what memories what insights will be forever left sitting in my files or the recesses of my mind if I don't share them this year? Given my sense that I have so much I still want to say, how will I winnow down all my feelings and thoughts into four half hour sermons? What final message do

What final message do I want to leave with the congregation?

Although I write these words a full two months before the holidays, I find myself already reflecting on some broad themes. What have been the central values and themes that have shaped my rabbinate and my service in this congregation over the past three decades? What have I treasured about this congregation, and what will I miss the most? How does one let go and say good-by in a constructive way that will allow all of us to move ahead confident in a future as yet undefined?

I never know quite what I am going to say over

the holidays until I put "pen to paper". This year perhaps the questions I want to address are a little more defined than in the past, but at this point the answers are not. I look forward to working with you as we make this transition together. I am confident that as we walk this path with one another, we will open the door to a great future at HJC and that we will sustain the legacy of all that we have accomplished together in the past.

Alisa and I wish the congregation a Shana Tova u'Metukah—May it be a healthy and sweet new year filled with many blessings.





President's Perspective

This has been an interesting summer. In late June we drove our youngest two boys (who are 18 and 19 years old) to the camp bus for their tenth summer at their beloved sleep-away camp. Once again we were looking forward to seven weeks of complete peace and quiet. However, literally straight from the camp bus we drove to South Nassau Communities Hospital in Oceanside to wait for hours

while my father-in-law underwent surgery to repair a broken femur. The surgery was a success thank God, but he had to stay in the hospital for 10 days and is still in a rehabilitation facility and has had to undergo a second surgery. My husband, Mitch and I are the only family that my fatherin-law has in New York, so every day has been filled with visiting (he dislikes the food so we are always armed with sandwiches and Ben's Deli), meetings with his rehab team, and thinking about where he will go after rehab (his current home in Woodmere has at least 6 steps to get to every level, including IN the front door).

Our time has come where we are now caring not only for our children but also for our parents. Between us we have five parents and step parents, a true blessing but soon to be a challenge as they all enter their 80's. This summer Nabisco came out with a new Oreo cookie called "Nabisco Light," one with less cream in the middle supposedly to attract adults. The analogy of our age group being the cream in the middle with our aging parents on one side and our young adult children on the other is even more fitting now as it feels like there is less of us to go around. We suddenly have become part of the "sandwich" generation (I was just a helicopter mom-where did the time go?) I have been anticipating this for years and have recently even started preparing for it as best we can. I had the good fortune to take a Wise Aging class in the Spring led by Elaine Kleinmann. We learned how to face the challenges ahead with authenticity and grace. Last month UJA offered an event where experts provided education on the many choices that lie ahead with our elderly parents. But still, the anticipation, and now the reality, is a bit daunting. We are totally responsible for a father who a few months ago was living on his own, driving to meet his friends at the diner or for a movie, and enjoying his independence. Now we are trying to decide if an assisted living facility or an apartment is the right fit for a man who is beginning to fail physically but is 110% mentally capable. And all this while he tries to wrap his head around the fact that his home in Woodmere for more than 40 years, to which he is totally attached, most likely will have to be sold (and that we will be

The most visible part of my job (but by no means the only part of it) is as the leader of prayer. As a Hazzan, it is my job to lead services on Shabbat, holidays, and the High Holidays. In Hebrew, the term is "Shaliach Tzibbur" which is most commonly translated as public messenger. As we approach a new Jewish year, I wanted to take a few moments to explore what that actually means and how our tradition of worship "works."

While Jews can pray at any time in any place, the act is supposed to

be a communal one. Even on Yom Kippur when we are atoning for our sins, almost the entire liturgy is expressed in the first person plural. Ashamnu means "we have sinned" not "I have sinned." There are many prayers that require a minyan, or a quorum of ten Jewish adults to be recited, as a way to emphasize the importance of community when attempting to communicate with God.

But not everyone knows how to pray. Many people don't know Hebrew, can't follow along, or aren't used to the various traditions and rituals associated with Jewish prayer: hence the Shaliach Tzibbur or "public messenger." For those who don't say the words for oneself, the obligation to pray can be fulfilled by listening and paying attention to the person who is leading. Saying Amen to a b'rakhah is seen as serious as having said the b'rakhah for oneself.

In practical terms, this may sound a bit strange, but to me, it is what I dedicate my life's work to. On any given day that I am leading services, there is a delicate balance of my personal thoughts and feelings, the words on the page, the notes to be sung, the feelings in the room, and the effort to keep God at the center of everything that I am doing. While there may be things that distract me or other events going on, it is my job to stay focused on the task at hand, and I take that job very seriously. All the more so on the high holidays when there is much more liturgy to get through and much of it is only recited three days a year.

The effort to stay focused on the page can be challenging in several ways. Recently I had an experience on Shabbat morning that really touched me. I was leading services and my son was in the chapel. He was upset and wanted me to come with him, but I couldn't since I was in the middle of the repetition of the Amidah. While he did not make much noise, he was pulling on my hand and the tzitzit on my tallit in a way that could have been very distracting to me and others.

As I was leaving the HJC after services and Kiddush, a congregant remarked not that he was distracted, but something else entirely: that the site of seeing my son pulling on my hand and tzitzit during the Amidah was very moving to him and a genuine display of Godly love. I hope that we can all look at things with such divine inspiration and optimism in the year to come. Shanah Tovah.

As he searched for a deeper connection to Judaism, he realized that rabbinical studies were to be his next step. It wasn't long before Neil understood that becoming a rabbi was a perfect career choice.

Alisa grew up in Wantagh in a family steeped in conservative judaism, her father a rabbi, and her mother a homemaker. Alisa was certain that she wanted a different path for herself. She was a math major at Barnard College, and pursued an additional degree at JTS in Talmud. In search of community, she spent Shabbatot at JTS. It was there that she and Neil met during her sophomore year. They were married a year later.

The Kurshans had busy lives as a young married couple. Neil was a student rabbi in Rockland County for two years. Alisa taught high school math at the Fieldston School. Ilana, their eldest child, was born a few days after Neil was ordained as a rabbi. Soon after, the young family moved to Congregation Beth Israel in Port Washington. Both Naamit and Ariella were born there. Towards the end of his tenure at Beth Israel, Neil was offered a contract to write a book based on a High Holiday sermon. *Raising Your Child to be a Mensch* was completed soon after he moved to Huntington.

In December 1984, Neil had his first interview at HJC. He felt an immediate connection, and thought it would be a good fit. So, did the HJC search committee. The Kurshans moved to Huntington in the summer of 1985.

They faced some physical challenges during their first few months in Huntington. Naamit broke her arm in the synagogue playground on their first Yom Kippur! Alisa describes waiting for many hours in the emergency room at Huntington Hospital that day since all the doctors were in shul! Their "custom-built" home did not yet have lawn or driveway when Hurricane Gloria hit and they had no power for two weeks. By their first Thanksgiving, in November 1985, everything felt right and Naamit agreed to finally unpack her suitcase.

These challenges were quickly overcome and, for Neil and Alisa, there have been many highlights during their thirty years in the HJC community. With his strong background in education, the rabbi was keen on creating educational opportunities for congregants. He achieved this goal through programs like hebrew literacy, shabbat literacy, the Spirituality Institute, five adult bat mitzvah classes, to name a few.

Alisa and Neil led five congregational trips to Israel. They describe these excursions as enormously fulfilling for themselves as educators and for the congregants who participated. These were shared 24/7 love-of-Israel events leading to powerful community building experiences.

Alisa is proud of all the years they hosted the Shavuot Tikkun at their house. This meant that Alisa baked 35 cheesecakes – "seems unfathomable!" They also hosted lunch with home-made cholent in their sukkah for Shabbat Sukkot. Alisa also taught Learners' Minyan on Shabbat mornings. This was all before Alisa starting working full-time at UJA-Federation.

While the Kurshan children were young, Alisa taught Hebrew school at Temple Beth Sholom in Roslyn, at Prozdor in LI and at Camp Ramah. Alisa started the Family Education Program at Temple Beth Sholom in Roslyn and was an active volunteer at the Solomon Schechter Day School. This all led Alisa on a search to improve Jewish education. At her family's strong urging, Alisa became a full-time student as a Wexner Fellow and received her masters and doctorate in Jewish policy making at JTS. In the course of her studies, Alisa interned at the UJA. Twenty-one years later, as Executive Vice President of Community Planning and Agency Resources, she continues to love what she does there. They both describe Alisa's work in the Jewish community as "macro," while Neil's work at HJC is the "micro" counterpart.

As a family, the Kurshans loved celebrating their children's smachot at HJC. Alisa describes Ilana's Bat Mitzvah as "an incredible transcendent experience" when they experienced so much warmth and support from the community. All their children feel the warmth and love from HJC and have found ways in their now-adult lives to reinforce similar experiences and bonds in their respective Jewish communities. During sadder times, Alisa and Neil each felt embraced by the support the HJC community extended to them – when Alisa's parents died more than 20 years ago, two years apart, and more recently, when the rabbi's parents died within months
