A Success Story

This is My covenant with you...the words which I have put into your mouth shall not depart from you, not from your children, not from your children's children henceforth and forever. (Isaiah 59:20)

Each year the Covenant Foundation chooses five promising Jewish educators from throughout the United States to receive its prestigious Pomegranate Award. The Pomegranate Prize established in 2011 recognizes emerging leaders in the field of Jewish education who have been in the field for ten years or less. In addition to financial support for their educational endeavors, the award allows prize recipients over a three year period to interact and engage with leading Jewish educators from the spectrum of Jewish life at Foundation sponsored events.

This year a young woman from our congregation was one of the five Jewish

educators to receive the prize. In its award to Lea Winkler, the daughter of Sheryl and Ian Winkler, the Covenant Foundation wrote the following:

"Lea Winkler is a third grade general studies teacher and the STEM Coordinator at Cohen Hillel Academy (CHA), a community Jewish day school in Marblehead, MA. Lea began at CHA as an intern through the DeLet Program at Brandeis University and obtained her first full time position at CHA upon her graduation. Lea received her B.A. in 2009 from Brandeis University, where she majored in History and minored in Elementary Education, and her M.A. in Teaching Elementary Education from Brandeis in 2010. During her time at Brandeis, she taught at the Boston-Area Jewish Education Program (BJEP), an independent Jewish Sunday school, where she began as an aide and became the Hebrew teacher for second through fourth grade. In this capacity, she received the Keter Torah Award for outstanding contribution to the Hebrew language curriculum. Lea also spent six summers working at Camp Ramah in Nyack, first as a counselor and then as a mentor counselor, and has led Junior Congregation at the Huntington Jewish Center."

There are many voices in the Jewish community that lament the quality of synagogue afternoon school Jewish education and its inherent limitations. They opine that there is little that can be accomplished in two or three days late in the afternoon when students are tired and worn out from their day in public school. While there is no question that a much more intensive Jewish education can be offered in a Day School setting, good synagogue schools backed by Jewishly committed families can offer a substantive Jewish education. Lea is case in point. While her award is fundamentally a recognition of her own hard work, talent, and exceptional achievement, Lea is also a product of our HJC synagogue school. That Religious School led by Cindy Dolgin received national recognition as a School of Excellence and produced students with a strong Jewish education. Lea's award reminds us that we should always strive for excellence in our synagogue school.

The Pomegranate Award recognizes achievement and distinction in a professional field that too often goes unnoticed. Lea is not unique in the sense that some of our "best and brightest" have chosen the field of Jewish education including one of our congregant's children who now is the lead educator in the Religious School of the Park Avenue Synagogue in Manhattan. Jewish education is a field in which a talented educator can make a difference not only in the lives of students, but also in sustaining a meaningful Jewish identity for the next generation of Jews. We wish Lea continuing success in her career, and hope her example will inspire more of our "best and brightest" to consider Jewish education as a meaningful and fulfilling career.



Sabbatical for Rabbi Neil Kurshan



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

ABOUT OUR PARK/CEMETERY

"Wait, don't hang up, or turn the page.... this isn't a sales call..." You've heard that before, but in this case it's true. I won't try to 'sell' you something that you already have. Okay, perhaps that's too flip a way to begin writing about a serious subject – a matter of life and death, but I wasn't sure of the best way to begin and I did want to write it. When it concerned the matter of death our immediate ancestors – those who emigrated from far away places – they had answers: Burial Societies. They recognized the importance of planning for future need. Many of us and our families have been connected to one or more of these organizations. Married couples may have more connections than they want, or need.

Which is what gets me to what I wanted to write: about our cemetery. As members of the Huntington Hebrew Congregation we own a cemetery (read the HJC 2007 Centennial Book p. 16 for history). It's not like many others in that it's truly park-like and a pleasant place to be when you're just visiting, given that it is a burial ground. Sure, it looks like a cemetery should. There are gravestones engraved with names, dates memorial information, but, it's kind of small in comparison even to small cemeteries. There's one road to drive in and out on, and all the paths and access to gravesites are on grass, walkable, and within view of the front gate.

If you haven't visited it you might be surprised to hear how a recent visitor remarked, "I can't believe I'm saying this, but this cemetery is a really lovely place to be if you have to be at a funeral or burial." It was Spring and we were standing under a flowering tree. Walking with a friend through the lanes recently we recalled the many friendships and connections as we saw the names of those we knew or had heard about. During the past few years I've had occasion to be there several times and at some funerals family members have mentioned how pleased

they are, at such a sad time, to know the loved one is buried in a place surrounded by those familiar names. And others have expressed regret that a family member was buried somewhere else because they had already had a plot available and that's what they used, but in retrospect would have preferred this place to visit.

Many of us who have loved ones buried there take advantage of opportunities to visit the graves on whichever occasion we are so inclined. I've been told it's comforting and being easy to reach and spend as much or as little time, is helpful.

No simple answers and no one answer fills all our needs, but a little perspective needed of a question we all have to ask. My suggestion is to take a ride one day and visit our cemetery/ memorial park on Old Country Road – the little one right next to Mt. Golda.

Mitzi Popkin

Mitzi Popkin has graced the classrooms, sanctuary and meeting rooms of the HJC with a serene presence for over fifty years. Her deep red lips, coal

black hair and elegant hats set on her head at a perfect angle, express an artistic flair that she shared with her husband Paul.

The Popkins first arrived in Huntington from Scranton, PA, with their sons Seth and Barry so that Paul could work for his uncle designing displays and signage at Popkin's store, an upscale home goods shop "in the station." Paul, a fine artist had owned his own sign and display business back in Scranton. Paul didn't love working for Popkin's store, but he and Mitzi loved Huntington. Paul set up his own business and supported his family doing commercial art.

Mitzi and Paul joined the HJC because it was "natural to join a synagogue. It was part of life." It didn't take long before, "we were knee deep involved. HJC was a huge part of our lives. Paul and I took part in many aspects of the community. So much of our life was devoted to Judaism." While growing up in Scranton Mitzi loved hebrew School; the hebrew language came easily to her. Her family lived across the street from the synagogue. The Rabbi's family rented the upstairs floor of her mother's home.

At HJC, Paul contributed through his artistry. He designed the library (of which he was the chairman) and illustrated numerous bulletin covers. Paul also served as a member of the synagogue Board. The walls of the Popkin home are covered with Paul's artwork. This interviewer observed rooms that perfectly capture modernist 1960's decor.

Mitzi's most cherished commitments at HJC were Junior Congregation and Junior Choir. First she taught Alef on Sundays. Eventually she "taught up through all the grades - except Hey. I loved my teaching and I humbly say the kids loved me. It was a mutual love, I was very motivated."

Mitzi's eyes sparkle when she speaks of learning about running Junior Congregation (JC) under her mentor Louis Wolf in Scranton, PA. Wolf was the inspiration for how Mitzi developed JC at HJC. His brilliance was in teaching the children to run JC as an adult congregation was run. "It was a whole big, busy way of life. There were many roles to be played and every child who was motivated found a role that fit his/her personality."

Involvement in JC was a commitment beyond Hebrew School. The children had a Board, committees and meetings. They had elections

and put up campaign posters. And of course services on Shabbat. "The children who were involved felt an important sense of prominence in the HJC community."

Here is a "picture of Junior Congregation in action":

• JC Board meetings were "war meetings" similar to adult board meetings; discussion, debate, digging in heels and compromise.

• There was a President, Vice President, Treasurer and Recording Secretary.

• Religious Services: Children sat in assigned rows. Each row had a Unit Leader who phoned the people in his/her row to keep them informed. The Unit Leaders were the "Big Machers."

• Torah Reader and Haftorah Reader committees, Rabbis who gave Dvar Torah, Hazannim who led chanting, Honors Committee gave out honors.

• Every child got a turn to do what s/he wanted, and each other.

• Annual Junior Congregation Banquet - a highlight of the year. The mothers cooked meat loaf and other dishes, waited tables while the children dined on real dishes and table linens.

Mitzi believes that so many children loved to be involved in JC because it was a child-led activity and a reflection of adult community life. The children grew up knowing how to run a congregation and services with confidence and competence – kids like Billy Wertheim, who was the president of Junior Congregation for two years.

Another big commitment of Mitzi's was Junior Choir. Singers learned prayers and songs for Shabbat, special occasions and of course the High Holidays. At rehearsals traditional and modern melodies were practiced.

Mitzi has many wonderful memories of her life at the HJC. "I look back with fondness and cherish those years. I worked full time as a secretary at the Touro Law School, which I loved, but I happily rushed from there to HJC, driving quickly down the hill." After Mitzi retired, parents would stop her in Huntington Village and at HJC services to tell her that she had taught their children. "I am humbled to think that they remembered."

Members who have been at the HJC for years will always remember Mitzi's sons: Seth, now a lawyer in Rockville, MD, with his wife Judith, a musician, and two grown sons Mathew and Jeffery. And Mitzi's son Barry, of blessed memory, an accomplished pianist and singer whose soulful voice was a highlight at Yom Kippur Services when he opened our hearts with his a cappella rendition of "Haben Yakir Li."
