HJC SUMMER 2017 SCHOLARSHIPS

"The most important thing about Judaism, is that it is not a subject to be learned in class or studied from a book, but a way of life that is to be experienced every day. The beauty of camp is that it makes that possible – a completely immersive Jewish experience. Instead of trying to impart lessons seated at a desk, children experience a living, breathing Judaism all day every day at camp. And not just Shabbat and Kashrut, but Hebrew Language, Israel, Rosh Chodesh, and Jewish values that imbue the rhythms of a regular day with even more meaning.

Sleep-away camp also allows kids to learn and grow, away from their parents, surrounded by friends their own age. The set-up of 18 year-old counselors caring for 13 year-old campers allows for major advancements and developments in personal identity growth and faith formation in ways that no other setting can. Daily rituals like morning prayers and birkat hamazon (grace after meals) become simply part of the routine. Jewish learning is engaged in by not only the campers, but all staff. The Ramah Camps is the official network of Jewish summer camps created and run by the Conservative movement."

Donald L. Gordon Israel Scholarship

– This scholarship is awarded to high school juniors and seniors who spend six to eight weeks during the summer in Israel. They tour, learn, and live the Israeli life in a Jewish educational program.

David S. Rosenman Camp Ramah Scholarship

- This scholarship is awarded to youngsters in grades 4 through 12 who spend either four or eight weeks at Camp Ramah in the Berkshires. This camp is under the auspices of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America. Applications for both scholarships are available in the HJC Main office and the deadline for submission is April 3, 2017.




2016-2017 HIHI SEASON

Becoming Trees of Life

As a way of getting in touch with the ongoing display and manifestation of God's creative and wondrous powers, we are advised by the psalmist to "lift up your eyes to the mountains, from whence comes my help". At this time of year, I am always amazed at the transformation of the landscape, especially the

hills and mountains. I always note on a daily basis, with great fascination, how the deciduous trees shed their leaves, each in sequence for their species. During the first two weeks of December, as I was walking daily to the synagogue in the mornings for our minyan, I admired the last "hold-outs" on the grove of trees beyond our east driveway – even as the colors of those leaves were turning, they held their position, maintained their divinely appointed posts, until the inevitable time for their return to the soil had come, in the best interest for the trees in the long term.

If we humble ourselves to be observant and attuned to the cycles of the trees surrounding us, we can learn from them and be inspired by their ongoing, living legacies. Firstly, we could not survive without them collectively. They provide oxygen for us to breathe, fruit for us to eat, shade for us to relax in, grounding for our soils and embankments, and inspiration for our souls. As we literally breathe the oxygen from the air they provide, we become intrinsically "inspired." Metaphorically, I'm always reminded of my grandmother's admonition whenever we would begin to slouch, to sit straight up like a tree when she would loudly announce "tree." It is not without basis that back during Sukkot the rabbis analogized the straightness of the lulav branch to the human spine, implying not only good and upright physical posture but a "straightforward" and "upright" moral stance as well.

Moreover, as we prepare for our upcoming festival celebrating the New Year for trees, Tu Bishvat, arriving this year on the Shabbat of February 11, 2017, we can become inspired by other aspects of the life cycle of trees. With incredible longevity, even when their leaves are shed, they certainly remain vital and alive. Although many of their interior physiological processes may not be observable to us during the latent season, they are collectively, as it were, "regrouping", reinforcing their



Bring in the Noise

As someone who spends a good deal of time making and listening to music, noise is something that I take seriously. And I have been thinking about it a lot recently, especially as it relates to the synagogue. We are surrounded by noises, both good and bad. How they affect us is a topic of major importance for all us individually, in addition to as a community as a whole. I'd like to explore this topic just a little bit in this month's bulletin article.

One of the main points of contention for many people is noise in the sanctuary during services. People have various reactions to different kinds of noises and they can be a distraction, a disruption, or a great addition to the service. If nothing else, davening is supposed to be participatory. As the cantor, one of the greatest noises I can hear is the mumble of people davening as we move through the liturgy. Not all people, however, are familiar with the Ashkenazic tradition of Jewish worship. Because of that, our service includes several congregational melodies that are simpler in structure, repetitive, and therefore (hopefully) easier to learn and sing along. Perhaps the greatest noise I can hear is a room full of people singing along with me. I believe this action lifts up our prayers to God in a more affective and effective manner for God and for us. In addition, there are the sounds of dialogue that often come with our Torah discussions. The give and take of members of our congregation speaking with and learning from each other over words of Torah is a wonderful segment of our service that requires no knowledge of Hebrew or any inherent musical skill.

Whenever a large gathering of people occurs, however, other noises are sure to come up. And just as important as the noises themselves, are the reactions that other people have to those sounds. As I always say, I would much rather the hear the sound of a baby crying or a child laughing than an adult talking or a cell phone ringing during services. But how do we respond to those sounds? Are we creating an even bigger disruption by turning around and glaring? By sighing loudly or commenting rudely? It's very important to consider not only our actions, but the consequences of our actions.

Lately, we've had a series of events called the PJ Library Bim Bam Family Shabbat programs. We had a Friday night service and dinner in November and a Havdallah and dinner in December. While seeing the synagogue alive with young families and small children running around makes me happy, I really think it's the sound of those children running, laughing (and even crying) that brings me the most joy. So when it comes to our congregation, both the young and the old, the new and the less so, I say, bring in the noise – just make sure it's not too disruptive to what's going on around you!



Spotlight on...



Joan and Norman Mattisinko

It is clear from the first moments of meeting them that Joan and Norman Mattisinko have been cooperative and complementary partners in life for a

long time. Both born and raised in Brooklyn, they met at a Jewish Federation brunch in Manhattan in 1959 and married a year later. Norman was working in Melville as an electrical engineer and when their first born, a daughter, Susan, was just under two years old they decided to move to Huntington, significantly cutting the one and a half hour commute he had from Brooklyn. A few years later, they had a son, Robert.

One thing that was important to them was finding a Jewish community and the Huntington Jewish Center was just what they were looking for. It was a young and growing community and the leadership was interested in fostering expansion and meeting its members' needs. With little hesitation, Joan and Norman became actively involved. The first of many accomplishments, Joan and four other Sisterhood members introduced the idea of starting a nursery school with the mission of providing HJC's youngest participants a Jewish education from an early age. At its beginning, the school was a cooperative; one parent of every child was obligated to function as a teacher's aid throughout the school year. Once the mothers began working outside the home and were less available, and the school had enough money so that they could afford two full-time teachers, the staff became exclusively professional. Joan recounts one poignant decision-point when Halloween was approaching and she was very clear that the children would not be coming to the synagogue wearing costumes. For that they would have to wait until Purim. Those early days led to lifelong friendships that Joan and Norman relish to this day.

Joan served as a long-time member of the HJC Sisterhood, chairing several committees but eschewing the role of President. Rather, she went back to school and earned a Masters degree in special education. She then did home schooling for the district and eventually ran the resource room in a Deer Park school. Meanwhile, Norman continued his work as an engineer in AIL and other companies in Melville. As his career wound down, he spent five years in

Burlington, MA, from which he commuted to home on weekends. Along the way, he served as President of the Men's Club, chaired the ritual committee and served one year as an HJC President. Traveling for work forced him to step down from that position.

They both described those early days as rich with friendship. Friday nights were the main event at HJC for years before Shabbat morning became more of a focus. The Friday night Oneg Shabbat was a wonderful venue for fostering strong social connections among congregants, which resulted in years of sharing simchas of baby namings, Bar and Bat Mitzvahs and marriages, as well as the losses that come with life. They recall that they witnessed the transition from Bat Mitzvahs only occurring on Friday nights to the time when girls could chant their haftarot on Shabbat morning. And Joan proudly mentions that she was one of the four women in the first women's adult Bat Mitzvah class. Joan actively participates on the Sisterhood Board as a member of the Membership Committee, and the Friday Night Live committee. In addition to their contributions at HJC, the JTS Torah Fund has benefited from Joan's presence, where she is on the National Board. She is also involved with Hadassah and various social activities, including a Yiddish club at The Greens, where they have lived for the past 13 years. They are proud of having visited Israel (Joan three times and Norman four), once on a congregational trip with Rabbi Rothenberg. Locally, they also enjoy going to the gym and to NYC, where they take advantage of the theater, museums and their membership at the Metropolitan Opera. More recently Joan and Norman have begun to spend part of their winters in Arizona, where they visit their son and his family; and California, where their daughter lives with her family. It is clear that their 4 granddaughters are the main focus of their lives now.

Joan and Norman are excited to witness the current progress at HJC, looking to the future with the strong lay leadership and anticipating the excitement of soon having a new rabbi. They feel it is their time to step back and allow the next generation to take a more central role in directing the HJC but they will still be involved in areas where they feel they can continue to contribute and offer support.

We also would not have reached this point without our negotiating team of Arthur Perler, Randi Schuller and Ken Bob. Arthur Perler, the chair of the team, spoke often with Rabbi Saks, and then met with the EC and the Board, and helped guide us though the entire process. Once the terms were negotiated, we needed to memorialize them and asked Ron Goldstein to lead us in this area. He took many phone calls and emails from us, and spent a significant amount of time producing a balanced and fair contract. Bruce Rosen reviewed the contract and helped give his perspective as to tax provisions. Jack Rubin, our Treasurer, also provided invaluable advice and a cool head, which was needed at times along the way. The other members of the Executive Committee as well as the Board of Trustees were very involved participants as well, weighing in on each

candidate and the terms of the contract.

But what really made this a successful process was each and every one of our congregants. By participating in parlor meetings, six weekends of Friday night services, Shabbat morning services, Saturday night activities, and Sunday meet and greets, by responding to six rounds of our on-line survey, and by grilling our candidates with some very difficult questions during the question and answer period, but always with respect and warmth, we have found ourselves an amazing new rabbi in Rabbi Saks. We have the greatest community here at HJC and Rabbi Saks and his wife Rachel know it and cannot wait to become a part of it.
