The History Behind Mid-Week Manna

One of my favorite memories from rabbinical school at the Jewish Theological Seminary occurred while taking a week-long learning intensive with a group of classmates on alternative forms of worship. On an unremarkable Wednesday afternoon, we travelled together from our home base at 122nd and Broadway to 138th

street and Lenox Avenue in the heart of Harlem. In that area of Harlem, Lenox Avenue is called Adam Clayton Powell Jr. Boulevard for the renowned Harlem civil rights activist, politician, and pastor of Abyssinian Baptist Church, one of the flag-ship African American congregations in the country, that resided on that corner. There we entered an impressive Gothic structure that was built in 1922 to house the Abyssinian Baptist Church while under the charismatic religious leadership of Powell's father, Adam Clayton Powell Sr. The church is well known for its activism in social change and community development fueled by Christian learning and worship, and as the doors opened for our small group of rabbinical students I finally understood why we were walking into this remarkable structure on an unremarkable Wednesday evening: Midweek Manna, an hour long service with the spiritual sustenance of praise and preaching (i.e. "manna") to rejuvenate worshippers in the middle of the week with the fuel they need to keep on doing their good-works.

I was intrigued with the concept and enthralled by my experience at Abyssinian. While the Christian worship made me a little hesitant, the music and the preaching felt energizing at a time of the week I needed it. It's like the second cup of coffee you need to get through the day (minus the caffeine). We only have so many resources to draw upon and as we enter the middle of the week, the luster of the previous weekend has worn off and it still feels so far to get to the next weekend. (No wonder Wednesday is called "hump day").

Interestingly enough, in the kabbalistic understanding of Shabbat, Shabbat is not the end of the week but rather the middle of the week! The week begins on Wednesday as we gear up for Shabbat in the middle of the week on Saturday, and ends on Tuesday as the joy of the previous Shabbat winds down and

dissipates. (By the way, this is the reason why we are allowed to recite Havdalah, the ceremony using candles, wine, and spices to mark the end of Shabbat, until Tuesday evening – because until that point we still experience the beautiful "aroma" of the previous Shabbat). So in light of this kabbalistic notion that Shabbat is the middle of the week that we are gearing up for beginning on Wednesdays, and in appreciation of the practical experience of Wednesdays as the lull point within traditional weeks (i.e. Monday to the weekend), it seemed muvan me-eilav (obvious) that the concept of having a Midweek Manna program would be a good idea in the Jewish world as well.

So if Mid-week Manna is designed to provide spiritual sustenance when we need it the most, what should that sustenance look like? At Abyssinian it looked like a standard (if not shortened) Sunday church service, with prayers, music, and preaching. Yet in thinking about the unique needs of our Jewish community, I'm drawn to a midrash in which the punch-line is that students in the Beit Midrash refused to stop their learning to help make a minyan. This is not to say that Jewish prayer cannot be energizing because it absolutely can be (as anyone who came to High Holiday services led by Cantor Gordan can attest to). Rather it's to say that Jewish learning is often a good entrée into experiencing soulful sustenance because it is taught in the vernacular and is open to exciting debate and back and forth conversation. Many people have been turned on to Jewish life by taking a class on a Jewish subject and finding they want to go deeper. When they get a taste of the energizing sustenance of Jewish wisdom they'll keep coming back for more, desiring as well to find opportunities to put their learning into practice. That's why our Mid-week Manna program - with lots of subjects taught multiple times a day every Wednesday from now to Christmas (see schedule for details) -is focused on Jewish learning, to give us a taste of the sustaining "manna" of Judaism. B'ezrat Hashem, hopefully one day we will be able to offer more flavors of manna in the middle of the week, including inspiring worship and good-works opportunities to grow together as a community (Abyssinian once ran a "Health Ministry" project during Midweek Manna to encourage people to live a healthier lifestyle) and to support our larger community. So come take a taste of the delicious manna of Jewish learning to sustain you through the week and fuel your souls.

Something new and exciting that is happening for me now as a cantor is my first "real" concert performance. On Sunday, November 12th I will be participating in the American Friends of Meir Panim benefit concert at the Suffolk Y-JCC, along with cantors from several other area synagogues. It has been an interesting experience to be involved with the planning and publicity efforts over the past several months. In addition to all of the organizing meetings, it has been great getting out in the community and getting to know other colleagues more.

I especially want to thank Elaine and Walter Kleinmann for serving on the concert committee and representing the HJC so well. I hope you will join us at the auditorium of the Suffolk Y-JCC on November 12th for what should be a wonderful program benefitting a most worthy cause. Meir Panim was established to help alleviate and diminish the harmful effects of poverty on thousands of men, women and children across Israel. Thanksgiving - the truly American holiday - is almost here. Giving thanks is especially meaningful this year, when many families are feeling the impact of our changing world in profound ways. While Thanksgiving is not a Jewish holiday, giving thanks, showing gratitude, and acting graciously and generously are part of daily Jewish practices and rituals. Reciting the Shehecheyanu, our universal prayer of thanksgiving, and the Modeh Ani, the first words we speak in the morning, we are continually mindful and appreciative of our many blessings.

The power of gratitude is significant. Recent research correlates children's social well-being and achievement in school with gratitude. Studies show that grateful students perform better in school and experience more positive emotions. Young children who are involved in experiences that value gratitude have also shown higher levels of self-control and self-regulation. As adults, we already know this intuitively. We recognize that expressing sincere gratitude and receiving heartfelt expressions of gratitude are uplifting, clarifying and motivating.

For American Jews, celebrating Thanksgiving and focusing on gratitude can become a framework to further incorporate Jewish values into our everyday lives. How wonderful that, in America, we share this most basic core value with our neighbors. Rabbi Levy recognizes that the blessings of family, friends and freedom and the physical, emotional and spiritual comforts of our lives are universal gifts from God. It is my hope that each one of us can focus on the abundance within our own homes, and find comfort with our families, friends, and the food and shelter that nourish us.

As we prepare to celebrate Thanksgiving, I want to express my gratitude to all of you, and to all the beautiful people who enrich my life every day. The blessing of family and friends coming together to share this holiday is a reminder of the benefits of slowing down to be able to recognize and develop deep gratitude for all the blessings in our lives.



Millions of children nationwide receive special education services in accordance with the IDEA (Individuals with Disabilities Education Act) legislation of 1975. While people tend to think of children with disabilities as being those with intellectual disabilities and mobility issues, often disabilities are "invisible": the child with ADHD, dyslexia, or a hearing impairment. These are the children those of us in the field of education often encounter in the classroom or summer camp bunk. I recently attended a roundtable discussion group at the Jewish Theological Seminary addressing the issue of inclusion in our Jewish educational environments. The session was led by our own Dr. Abigail Uhrman, professor at the Davidson School of Education. Abby and her colleagues at JTS invited various representatives from the world of Jewish camping, schools, and spe-

cial education to discuss this important and timely subject.

Some of the questions addressed included:

- What do future educators need to learn in order to view teaching through the "lens" of inclusive practice?
- How can our youth groups and summer camps best include children of all abilities and needs?
- What can those of us who work in Jewish education do to be agents of change regarding inclusion?

The result was a thought-provoking discussion that will hopefully lead to the implementation of some forward-moving strategies. I am optimistic that the Jewish community at large will continue to address this critical issue, which affects so many of us, in the future.



Saving a Life through Organ Donation and Transplantation

National Donor Sabbath is observed annually on Friday through Sunday two weekends before Thanksgiving (November 10th – 12th , 2017). During this three-day observance, faith leaders, donor families, transplant recipients, and donation and transplantation professionals join forces to increase awareness of the need for life-saving organ, tissue, and eye donation.

Judaism teaches that saving a human life takes precedence over maintaining the sanctity of the human body. "If one is in the position to donate an organ to save another's life, it's obligatory to do so, even if the donor or their family never knows who the beneficiary will be. The basic principle of Jewish ethics - 'the infinite worth of the human being' - also includes donation of corneas, since eyesight restoration is considered a life-saving operation" according to Rabbi Dr. Moses Tendler, Professor of Talmud and Biology at Yeshiva University and Chairman of the Bio-ethics Commission of the Rabbinical Council of America. "It is given that the donor must be brain dead in accordance with the standards set by the Harvard University criteria and the President's Commission on brain death" he adds. Organ donation is actually a "moral obligation". It is the only "mitzvah" an individual can perform after death. The duty of saving an endangered life (pikkuah nefesh) suspends the operation of all the commandments in the Torah, with the exception of three prohibitions: no man is to save his life at the price of murder, adultery or

idolatry. The sages of the Talmud interpret the words "he shall live by them," in Leviticus 18:5, to mean that the mitzvah, the divine commands, are to be a means of life and not of death.

Judaism places primacy on saving and enhancing life which organ donation and transplantation do. The responsibility and obligation to save life supersedes other considerations including desecration of the body after death (body is treated with utmost respect), derivation of benefit from the corpse (organs recovered that will save another's life), and lack of a full burial for the deceased (transplanted organs will be buried with the body). As long as one life is not destroyed to save another and the lifesaving methods are within the context of moral and ethical responsibility, God's will is done. According to Jewish law, transplantation is allowed, and even encouraged, if it does not hasten death, if it is performed with respect for the body, and if body parts not used for transplantation are buried. The highest human value in Jewish philosophy is to emulate God, which can be done through acts of love, compassion, and concern, including organ donation and transplantation.
