Dedication of Sanctuary Windows

Excerpted from remarks delivered by Ofer Rind on June 3rd, 2016 (27 Iyar 5776) at the ceremony to dedicate the new HJC sanctuary windows:

These eight dazzling windows above the ark were designed by Jeanette Kuvim Oren, the same artist who designed the beautiful parochet on the front of our ark, as well as our Torah covers.

Though evocative of stained glass, they are actually the product of a unique multi-media process combining silk fiber art, photography, and glass work. A nod to the existing stained glass is provided by the flowing black lines that echo its leading. The artist has also taken special care to integrate the color palette with both the windows and the ark curtain, creating a spectrum (perhaps inadvertently) that increases in temperature as you move toward the ark in the center. That is something a physicist can particularly appreciate.

Thematically, the windows expand upon the metaphor of Torah as light, that is evident in the words of Isaiah on the ark curtains:

קוּמִי אוֹרִי, כִּי בָא אוֹרְךָ
Arise, shine, for your light has come

Or, in this context: Stand up, bask in the light of Torah and allow it to reflect off of you. With the windows, we go from reflected light to transmitted light, streaming in through the purposely transparent words that traverse the panes in a luminous wave form. The words the artist chose are from Sim Shalom, the nineteenth blessing of the Amidah. They begin:

בְּרַכְנוּ, אֲבִינוּ, כְּלָנוּ כְּאֶחָד בְּאוֹר פְּנִיךָ
Bless us, one and all, with Your light

And what does this light bring us? The prayer continues:

כִּי בְאוֹר פְּנִיךָ נִתְּנָה לָנוּ ה' אֱלֹהֵינוּ תּוֹרַת חַיִּים וְאַהֲבַת חֶסֶד וְצְדָקָה
וּבְרַכָּה וְרַחֲמִים וְחַיִּים וְשְׁלוֹם

For by that light, You have given us the Torah as a guide to a life of loving kindness, righteousness, blessing, mercy and peace.



Last month there was a power outage at the synagogue. A main power line went down somewhere along Park Avenue and over 1000 homes and businesses were affected. It was a warm day – about 87 degrees and we were without lights, air conditioning, refrigeration, telephone service and computer access for about two hours. The phones stopped ringing, there was no clicking of keyboards furiously typing out emails, the drone of the air conditioning gone. It was Silent. Darkened. Warm.

So with the robust sounds of HJC gone mute, no emails to access or return, no phone calls to answer or make and nothing to eat (the fear of getting locked in a totally darkened dairy freezer – I'd rather starve!) it got me to thinking – we really are so dependent upon technology, that without it, even for the shortest of amount of time, our productivity comes to a complete halt. I am not a highly technological person – that is by design. I understand the importance of technology and give it its due respect as a valued component of our modern society, but I don't relish it. Weird right? How have I been able to survive? How have I not withered away? I am in the midst of a self-induced technological drought!

My annual summer vacation is to a beautiful seaside cottage on a small Island in Maine right on Penobscot Bay. There is no telephone service, no television, no computer access. Cell phone service is available, but on a cloudy day it might not work. Oh well. It is a bucolic slice of heaven; a treasured spot I have travelled to my entire life. It would not recognize technology if it tapped in on the shoulder and it certainly wouldn't yield to it, for it is one of those sacred places on earth where it is simply not needed.

I think we all secretly long for that simplicity. Harken back to the good old days where you had to get up out of your chair to change the channel. Do you ever look back at old letters & postcards you were sent at summer camp? Remember how happy you were to receive them. How special they were. How your grandmother's handwriting on a recipe card makes you smile. Now it's an email from bubie@gmail.com giving you a FB link for a chicken soup recipe. See what I mean – if the power's goes out, you actually could starve!

I think there is something to be said about being able to keep reasonable management of your life without the dependency on technology. Do I want to type memos again? No. Use the mimeograph machine? Probably not. But there is something interesting and nostalgic about happening upon an office memo typed on onion paper. It's like finding an ancient relic.

There are so many people to thank for making the Rabbi's Legacy events a loving send-off for the Kurshan family. A true sense of community infused every moment of these events. I received so many emails the following morning from people who said ...simply ...“I woke up smiling”.

In addition to the more than 60 volunteers and HJC staff who helped these events take off, approximately 400 past and present congregants and friends and family of the Kurshan's attend Rabbi's Farewell Shabbat. Approximately 330 guests packed the room for the Sunday reception...yes, on Father's Day!. We have raised over \$320,000 for the Rabbi's Legacy fund so we can keep his programs and the life we know at HJC alive.

Our community is a gift from Rabbi Kurshan. It is a living being that he nurtured. He did not do it for us, but with us. His departure creates a huge void, for sure, but the events in June have shown us that we can fill that void with our faith and ourselves. In addition to helping guide us through our spiritual lives, Rabbi Kurshan has left us the great gift of our strong and positive relationships with one another. If you had witnessed, as I did, a kitchen filled with an “all hands on deck” Sisterhood carrying out Sarah Saunders carefully drawn plans for preparing a Kiddush for 400 guests you would know exactly what I mean.

It took a full year of cooperation, dozens of meetings and phone calls and over 900 emails to make these events a reality. Below is a list of everyone whose volunteer efforts helped to make these events successful. I can't possibly



The Gift of Jewish Summer Camp

The Gift of Jewish Summer Camp

I'm writing this bulletin article having just returned from spending seven and a half weeks at the Ramah Day Camp in Nyack, NY. I worked at Ramah Nyack last year for several weeks and spent many summers before that at Ramah California. There are not adequate words to describe Jewish summer camp and how important it is for Jewish children (and indeed, Jewish families) growing up in this country – but I will try.

The most important thing about Judaism, is that it is not a subject to be learned in class or studied from a book, but a way of life that is to be experienced every day. The beauty of camp is that it makes that possible – a completely immersive Jewish experience. Instead of trying to impart lessons seated at a desk, children experience a living, breathing Judaism all day every day at camp. And not just Shabbat and Kashrut, but Hebrew language, Israel, Rosh Chodesh, and Jewish values that imbue the rhythms of a regular day with even more meaning.

Sleep-away camp also allows kids to learn and grow, away from their parents, surrounded by friends their own age. The set-up of 18-year-old counselors caring for 13-year-old campers allows for major advancements and developments in personal identity growth and faith formation in ways that no other setting can. Daily rituals like morning prayers and birkat hamazon (grace after meals) become simply part of the routine. Jewish learning is engaged in by not only the campers, but all staff. The Ramah Camps is the official network of Jewish summer camps created and run by the Conservative movement. In addition, there are Orthodox and Reform summer camps, a Reconstructionist summer camp, as well as many independent Jewish camps.

The Ramah Day Camp in Nyack is unique in its structure. It is actually a day camp for campers, entering Kindergarten through 8th grade, who come from New York City, Westchester, Rockland County, and New Jersey. Many staff also come to work for the day, but the majority of the counselors, as well as some adult staff, live at the camp (including my family and me). Matthew Wertheim and Yair Koas from the congregation also worked at Ramah Nyack, and we all had a great time.

My daughter, Maya, was in the baby gan, my son Eli was in the big gan, and my daughter, Noa, was a camper in the Shorashim edah (the age-group for children entering first grade). My wife, Abby, was a Rosh Edah (division head) for the kids entering 2nd grade and I was what's called Rosh Tefillah, meaning I taught two shiurim (or classes) a day and also worked with the staff and edot (age groups) on their tefillot.

I cannot recommend strongly enough Jewish summer camp for your children. If you are thinking about it or have any questions, I would be happy to speak with you. I met my wife at Ramah California, some of my closest and oldest friends are from Ramah, and I am not alone in that. Camp is the journey for a summer that lasts a lifetime!

Cantor Gordan and Abby Uhrman

Cantor Israel Gordan was born in Seattle, Washington. When he was a young child his family moved to Needham MA and later to Longmeadow, MA. He is the youngest of three children. He has a brother who lives in Philadelphia and a sister in Boston. The Cantor grew up in a

traditional Conservative home. He majored in Urban Studies at Columbia College in New York. When he graduated from college he moved to LA and worked for a producer in Hollywood for two years in creative development. During that time he was unsure of the professional path he would pursue. He had always had a good relationship with his cantor from growing up. He began to reflect more on what it would truly mean to have a full-time job. I would humbly suggest that these are questions regarding not just of destination but

ultimately more importantly that of destiny. It is occupation with these types of questions that we can look forward to engaging in most deeply – although ideally during every day of our lives through conscious awareness – during our upcoming High Holy Days starting thankfully “later” this year at the beginning of October!
