Redefining Our Youth Programming

One area that has become a COVID casualty is youth programming. Across the country, leadership, parents and students have noticed a reduction or lack of programming for our students. The creative ideas once used on Zoom to draw students have become dull and lost their appeal. I can relate. In the Spring of 2020 I was only too eager to

connect with people outside my home. I joined lectures, had coffee with friends and celebrated holidays online. Now, when I hear of another Zoom session, you can probably "hear" my eyes rolling. Don't misunderstand, connecting online does have advantages and value, I just prefer more organic get togethers. With firm restrictions in place and parents erring on the side of caution youth programming is almost nonexistent. Until now...

HJC has recently hired Rachel Rothschild, our new Youth Advisor. After living in Israel for a year, Rachel has returned home. She is currently working in our ECC and she is assisting me in planning some incredible programs for all ages. Prior to my arrival programming was limited to Grades 4-12 with Chaverim, Kadima and USY. Together, Rachel and I are planning events for various age groups beginning

in Kindergarten. It should be noted that all of our events always respect HJC's COVID guidelines. In November we planned a Family Farm Day for all ages. For Chanukah, we had a cooking class online for all ages and learned how to make Sufganiot (Jelly Doughnuts) in a mug! Dec. 19th we are bringing Krav Maga (Israeli Self Defense) to HJC for Grades 5-8. With Rachel and I working together there is no shortage of creativity. Please be sure to watch your emails and check our closed Facebook page for advertising. Events are open to all children ages 5-18 in our congregational family.

A monthly bulletin wouldn't be complete without mentioning all the wonderful learning happening in our school. I'm a strong proponent of learning by doing. Chanukah was celebrated with arts and crafts, song, cooking, and a social action project. The students spent time making "no sew" blankets that will be donated to an assisted living facility in our neighborhood. Our children learn about Shabbat by making challah, Havdallah candles and b'samim (spices). During Community Time they lead Havdallah and learn Hatikvah. It is invigorating to walk through the halls surrounded with the buzz of learning. When I think of my role as an educator whether planning curriculum or social events, I am reminded what a privilege it is to work with your children, forging relationships and helping them learn both inside and outside the classroom.

Strong Roots: HJC's Native Species Garden

Many of us know the HJC grounds like we do our own homes. We recognize when the ECC introduces a new piece of equipment in the play yards, when the tents go up for the High Holy Days, or when they come down. If you too know the HJC property this well, then you likely have been watching with interest the planting of HJC's Native species Garden, located alongside the Grow to Give Garden.

What is a Native Species Garden? As the name states, it is a garden filled with plantings that are native to this area from before the Colonial period. There are many reasons to plant a native species garden, and here are just a few of the benefits they yield for the environment:

- Since native plants don't require fertilizers or pesticides, we are keeping harmful chemicals out of the garden.
 By not allowing them to seep into the ground, we are also keeping them out of our drinking water.
- The deep roots of native plants ensure that this garden, once established, will not be reliant on regular watering, enabling us to conserve water.
- Native plants, like all plants, remove carbon dioxide from the air. With their deep roots, native species more effectively store carbon than other plants.
- Native plants provide shelter and food for wildlife.
- Native plants promote biodiversity and stewardship of our natural heritage.
- Native plants are beautiful and increase scenic value.

Caring for the HJC Native Species Garden is the responsibility of the HJC Environmentalism Committee. We have taken on this program to make our congregational home more aligned with our values. Through this garden, we will not only provide a welcome environment for pollinators, but we are also giving congregants a space for reflection as well as amazement. As seasons change in the garden, each one will be marked with colorful blooms and a variety of insects for us to observe.

The Native Species Garden is the first initiative of HJC's newest committee - the **Environmentalism Committee**. We all know the work of healing our environment is a shared responsibility, and the efforts that the Environmentalism Committee can engage in are almost without number. Therefore, we ask you to join us and take your place on this committee and support HJC's efforts to be God's partner in caring for our environment. We welcome new teen and adult members.
