Be the 10th for Minyan

Most people think that we get the idea of a minyan - the quorum needed for communal prayer - from the 10 righteous people that Abraham wanted to find in Sodom and Gomorarah. But in fact, the idea of needing 10 for a minyan comes from the 10 spies who had bad reports of the land of Israel. What's the difference between the two cas-

es? In the case of Sodom, the issue is character. In the case of the 10 spies, the issue is leadership. In the case of Sodom, you could be a good person but the impact of your goodness could stop at your front door. In the case of the 10 spies, your opinion - positive or negative - can shape the destiny of a community. Thus, the rabbis teach us that since 10 spies could speak for all Israelites, 10 Jews are not only necessary to form a community, they can speak for the larger community they are part of. That's why if we have 10 people from our community praying, it is as if our entire community is praying, even if they are not present to answer "Amen".

One of the greatest challenges of the pandemic is to keep HJC's daily minyan viable. While we've met regularly during the pandemic we've had to play with setting different times for services, with deciding how to meet in person and/or virtually, and with choosing what prayers should be recited if we meet virtually. At each step we've tried to ensure 10 people to make a minyan, but it has not been easy. Our participation has ebbed and flowed, especially as the pandemic continues to run its course. But ev-

ery day we still come together. Every day we come together to do what a synagogue is meant to do: to nurture our souls with prayer, to check in with one another and hear our joys and sorrows, and to engage our minds with interesting insights. In other words, Minyan is where we meet every day, even if we're not there to say hello. But in order for a few people to be enough for our whole community to meet, we need the 10th for a minyan.

Imagine then what it must feel like to be the 10th for a minyan. You make it possible for a mourner to say kaddish, you make it possible to add prayers that add to our praise for God, you create the opportunity for Torah to be read in public, and most important of all you make it possible for our whole community - even those not present - to be together as a community. It's also not something you can do alone - you need at least 9 other folks to join you. So as we begin this new Jewish year trying to work on our personal character like the righteous of Sodom, let us also keep in mind that our goodness does not stop at the door. As such, I encourage each one of our members - whether you've attended minyan in the past or never before - to take a step out and at least once this year for all of us to be the 10th - or the 9th or the 11th - for minyan so that all of HJC can say "Amen."




Israel's New Unity Government: Why is it so Important?


Thursday, Nov 11th at 8pm

Jewish Entertainers

Mel Brooks



Mel Brooks (born Melvin Kaminsky; June 28, 1926) is an American actor, comedian, film producer, director and screenwriter. With a career spanning over 7 decades he is known as a creator of broad film farces and comedic parodies. Brooks began his career as a comic and a writer for Sid Caesar's variety show *Your Show of Shows* (1950–1954) alongside Woody Allen, Neil Simon and Larry Gelbart. Together with Carl Reiner, he created the comic character *The*

2000 Year Old Man. He wrote, with Buck Henry, the hit television comedy series Get Smart, which ran from 1965 to 1970.

In middle age, Brooks became one of the most successful film directors of the 1970s, with many of his films being among the top 10 moneymakers of the year they were released. His best-known films include *The Producers* (1967), *The Twelve Chairs* (1970), *Blazing Saddles* (1974), *Young Frankenstein* (1974), *Silent Movie* (1976), *High Anxiety* (1977), *History of the World, Part I* (1981), *Spaceballs* (1987), and *Robin Hood: Men in Tights* (1993). A musical adaptation of his first film, *The Producers*, ran on Broadway from 2001 to 2007 and was remade into a musical film in 2005.

In 2001, having previously won an Emmy, a Grammy and an Oscar, he joined a small list of EGOT winners with his Tony Award wins for *The Producers*. He received a Kennedy Center Honor in 2009, a Hollywood Walk of Fame star in 2010, the 41st AFI Life Achievement Award in June 2013, a British Film Institute Fellowship in March 2015, a National Medal of Arts in September 2016, and a BAFTA Fellowship in February 2017. Three of his films ranked in the American Film Institute's list of the top 100 comedy films of the past 100 years (1900–2000), all of which ranked in the top 15 of the list: *Blazing Saddles* at number 6, *The Producers* at number 11, and *Young Frankenstein* at number 13.

Brooks was married to Florence Baum (1926–2008) from 1953 to 1962, their marriage ending in divorce. They had three children: Stephanie, Nicky, and Eddie. Brooks married stage, film and television actress Anne Bancroft in 1964, and they remained together until her death in 2005. They met at a rehearsal for the Perry Como Variety Show in 1961, and were married three years later on August 5, 1964, at the Manhattan Marriage Bureau. Their son, Max Brooks, was born in 1972, and their grandson, Henry Michael Brooks, was born in 2005.

In 2010, Brooks credited Bancroft with having been "the guiding force" behind his involvement in developing *The Producers* and *Young Frankenstein* for the musical theater, saying of an early meeting with her: "From that day, until her death ... we were glued together."

Regarding religion, Brooks stated: "I'm rather secular. I'm basically Jewish. But I think I'm Jewish not because of the Jewish religion at all. I think it's the relationship with the people and the pride I have. The tribe surviving so many misfortunes, and being so brave and contributing so much knowledge to the world and showing courage."

Brooks was born Melvin Kaminsky on June 28, 1926, in Brooklyn, New York, to Max (1895–1929) and Kate (née Brookman) Kaminsky (1896–1989), and grew up in Williamsburg. His father's family were German Jews from Danzig (present-day Gdańsk, Poland); his mother's family were Jews from Kiev, in the Pale of Settlement of the Russian Empire (present-day Ukraine). He had three older brothers: Irving, Lenny, and Bernie. Brooks's father died of kidney disease at 34 when Brooks was 2 years old. He has said of his father's death, "There's an outrage there. I may be angry at God, or at the world, for that. And I'm sure a lot of my comedy is based on anger and hostility. Growing up in Williamsburg, I learned to clothe it in comedy to spare myself problems—like a punch in the face."

Brooks was a small, sickly boy who often was bullied and teased by his classmates because of his size. He grew up in tenement housing. At age 9, Brooks went to a Broadway show with his uncle Joe—a taxi driver who drove the Broadway doormen back to Brooklyn for free and was given the tickets in gratitude—and saw *Anything Goes* with William Gaxton, Ethel Merman and Victor Moore at the Alvin Theater. After the show, he told his uncle that he was not going to work in the garment district like everyone else but was absolutely going into show business.

Brooks graduated from Eastern District High School. He also studied psychology at Brooklyn College for one year.

Brooks was drafted into the United States Army in 1944. After scoring highly on the Army General Classification Test—a Stanford–Binet-type IQ test—he was sent to the elite Army Specialized Training Program at the Virginia Military Institute to be taught skills such as military engineering, foreign languages, or medicine.

Brooks served as a corporal in the 1104th Engineer Combat Battalion, 78th Infantry Division, defusing land mines as the Allies advanced into Nazi Germany. He also fought in the Battle of the Bulge. With the end of the war in Europe, Brooks took part in organizing shows for captured Germans and American forces.

As founder of Brooksfilms, an independent moviemaking concern, Brooks engaged in a parallel career as an executive producer of serious "quality" films, including *The Elephant Man* (1980), *Frances* (1982, uncredited), and *84 Charing Cross Road* (1987). Brooks costarred with Bancroft in *To Be or Not to Be* (1983), a remake of the Ernst Lubitsch-directed film of the same name. His work as an actor included regular appearances on the popular TV sitcom *Mad About You* in the late 1990s, for which he won three Emmys, and a guest stint on the HBO series *Curb Your Enthusiasm*. He won a Grammy Award for the spoken comedy album *The 2000 Year Old Man* in the Year 2000 (1998). In addition, he lent his voice to various TV shows and films. The latter included the animated *Hotel Transylvania* series (2015, 2018). In 2019 he voiced the character of Melephant Brooks in the animated feature *Toy Story 4*.

Brooks made a spectacular comeback in 2001 as producer, composer, and librettist of the hugely popular Broadway stage musical based on *The Producers*. Brooks received several Tony Awards for the production, and with these wins he became one of the few entertainers to have earned an EGOT (Emmy, Grammy, Oscar, and Tony). He followed this in 2007 with a Broadway musical based on *Young Frankenstein*.

Brooks was named a Kennedy Center honoree in 2009 for his contributions to American comedy.
