

Experiencing the Spark of Your Inner-Yid

Chances are that if you're reading this message, there's been at least one seminal moment in your life when you either felt a connection to being Jewish, or (if you don't identify as Jewish) you developed an appreciation for what Judaism has to offer. In other words, regardless of our particular experiences, we share

a universal feeling of the importance of whatever-it-is-that-we-call-"Jewish."

Understanding these experiences is critical because they spark our "inner yid," the part of us that feels a deep attachment to Judaism, and it is only by tapping into that "inner yid" that we can begin to more deeply explore the importance, relevance, and impact that Judaism can have on our lives. Torah has always been a pathway to experience that attachment. As our tradition teaches us, talmud Torah k'neged kulam, which could be translated as "the study of Torah is the greatest of all Jewish pursuits." As we approach the holiday of Shavuot this month, I encourage you to take advantage of the oppor-

tunities available to experience how Torah can connect you to your "inner yid."

Music is also a key pathway for igniting our "inner yid." I've been in conversations with many of you in which we've talked about the critical role that music plays developing a connection to Judaism. For some that's discovering a new tune and for others it's harnessing the nostalgic power of traditional melodies. Over his first 10 years at HJC, Cantor Gordan has demonstrated his superior ability to spark our inner yid with melodies new and old, and I am so excited to join our congregation in celebrating his decade of music with all of you at the beginning of the month.

So whether our services and programming this month leaves you with a tune, a story, or a teaching bouncing through your head, I pray that you will experience a moment (or more) of attachment to your "inner yid," because once you feel that "inner yid" there's no telling how much whatever-it-is-that-we-call-"Jewish" can make a positive impact in your life.

Shavuot 2021 will begin in the evening of Sunday, May 16 and ends in the evening of Tuesday, May 18

Shavuot marks the wheat harvest in the Land of Israel (Exodus 34:22) and it also commemorates the anniversary of the giving of the Torah by God to the Children of Israel at Mount Sinai.

The word Shavuot means "weeks" and it marks the conclusion of the Counting of the Omer. Its date is directly linked to that of Passover; the Torah mandates the seven-week Counting of the Omer, beginning on the second day of Passover, to be immediately followed by Shavuot. This counting of days and weeks is understood to express anticipation and desire for the giving of the Torah. On Passover, the people of Israel were freed from their enslavement to Pharaoh; on Shavuot, they were given the Torah and became a nation committed to serving God.

The Delights of the Sabbath

This past fall in rabbinical school I took a Halachot of Shabbat class and just this spring, I took a Talmud class called The Sabbath through History. With all of that material in mind, I have been teaching an adult ed class entitled the History and Halachot of Shabbat and even though we have already met five times, we still have three more sessions before the end

of the year if you'd like to join us! We meet every third week on Saturday mornings over zoom before services begin from 9:15am to approximately 9:52 or so. We've been looking at a lot of sources and have had some fascinating discussions together as a small group. I'd love to share a little bit of what we've learned.

Like most things that we practice as rabbinic Jews, the origins of the Sabbath as described in the Torah are sparse and the details are few. Shabbat is first described as what God did after creating the world in six days. Later it is given as a commandment for the Israelites to imitate and honor God through its observance. Later still it is given a few prohibitions concerning gathering and lighting wood for fire, preparing food, and the distance one can travel. The commandment is widened to include non-Israelites living within the Israelites midst as well as animals. Finally in remembrance of the exodus from Egypt is added to the reasons why the Sabbath is observed (in addition to remembrance of creation), which is about it when it comes to the Torah and Shabbat.

The main question that arises from this initial description is: to whom does Shabbat belong? Is it God's day? Is it a day for us to emulate God's behavior? Is our observance of the Sabbath a way to honor God? Does not observing the sabbath offend and upset God? Is it just for Jews, all people, or all creatures, including the land itself (which rests every seven years on the sabbatical cycle in Israel)?

The rabbis quickly set to the task of fleshing out what the requirements and restrictions are for observance of the sabbath in their post-biblical writings. There are many detailed commandments and prohibitions concerning Shabbat, but one of the most important ideas for the rabbis is "hachanah l'Shabbat" or preparing for Shabbat. While God created the world in six days and rested on the seventh, our weekly rhythm is supposed to be more like working five days a week, preparing for Shabbat on the sixth, and then observing Shabbat on the seventh and final day.

Interestingly enough, it is this preparation for Shabbat that is probably least observed in the non-Orthodox world. Many of us do not feel compelled to have everything that we need for the 25 hours starting Friday evening set up before Friday evening, and everything that we do not need, removed from our space. And yet, that is what much of the discourse surrounding Shabbat is concerned with.

I'm wondering how you feel about this, and if you'd like, please join us on Saturday, May 8th, May 29th, and June 19th to continue the conversation!

HJC Summer 2021 Scholarships

"The most important thing about Judaism, is that it is not a subject to be learned in class or studied from a book, but a way of life that is to be experienced every day. The beauty of camp is that it makes that possible – a completely immersive Jewish experience. Instead of trying to impart lessons seated at a desk, children experience a living, breathing Judaism all day every day at camp. And not just Shabbat and Kashrut, but Hebrew Language, Israel, Rosh Chodesh, and Jewish values that imbue the rhythms of a regular day with even more meaning.

Sleep-away camp also allows kids to learn and grow, away from their parents, surrounded by friends their own age. The set-up of 18 year-old counselors caring for 13 year-old campers allows for major advancements and developments in personal identity growth and faith formation in ways that no other setting can. Daily rituals like morning prayers and birkat hamazon (grace after meals) become simply part of the routine. Jewish learning is engaged in by not only the campers, but all staff. The Ramah Camps is the official network of Jewish summer camps created and run by the Conservative movement."

Donald L. Gordon Israel Scholarship

View From The Director's Chair



After A Second COVID Shot, A Taste of Freedom By Len Berk

This article is being reprinted from The Forward. Len Berk worked for 26 years behind the lox counter at Zabar's. He is the Forward's lox columnist.

I hope you find this article speaks as universally as I did, which is why I decided to share it here. Read along and swap out Len's personal information for your own. Maybe

you got your shot at Jones Beach, or Stony Brook, or Walgreens! And maybe you took a walk in Hecksher Park or at Caumsett State park or at your local high school track. No matter - it's the feeling, the feeling we all have that is the same; the relief, the comfort, the excitement, the joy. WELCOME BACK, BABY!

It's 10 degrees in Kansas City, and snowing. It's 17 degrees in Memphis, and snowing. Traffic is snarled all over the country's midsection and there are accidents because of icy roads and poor vision, but here in New York where we usually get the snow and ice, it is 45 degrees and partly sunny. This is what I woke up to this morning. It's a sign! I normally don't believe in signs, but this is a sign. I'm very excited. At 1 p.m. this afternoon Llewellyn and I will get into my car and drive to The Atrium, In the Montifiore Health complex in the Bronx, to get our second shot of the Pfizer CO-VID vaccine and then, the way I see it, I may have to wait another week to be sure of my 95 percent security blanket, but as George Costanza's father says "I'M BACK, BABY."

I've been waiting for this day since March 2020, when I stopped working, as did so many others, and went into a modified hibernation. I haven't hugged my kids or grandkids in almost a year. Nor have I been to a restaurant, a movie theater, a Broadway play. All this inactivity crept up on me slowly starting last March and then one day it was as though life as I knew it was over. For how long, it was anybody's guess. But now, for Llewellyn and me, the hard times will be coming to an end. I think I'll even go back to work. There's a lot of lox out there for me to slice. It'll be great to see all the guys behind the counter. Will I remember how the scales work?

12 p.m. arrived. We got into the car for our short trip to the vaccination site. I drove kind of slowly so as to prolong the whole episode. I thrived on getting closer and closer to the site. I pulled in to the parking area and someone was pulling out. Last month, when we took our first shot, parking spots were hard to find.

We exited the car and entered the Atrium, approached the reception desk and showed our credentials. No one was there but us. A month ago, when we arrived for our first shot it was quite crowded. "Second floor," he said. We proceeded to the elevator, got off on the second floor, and stepped out into a long and empty corridor. Last month, same spot there was a long and slow moving line. It took nearly an hour to arrive at the entrance to the rooms

where the vaccinations were being given. Today there was no one in sight. We just walked down the long corridor, turned the corner and saw the official waiting at the entrance to the vaccination room. We entered the almost-empty room and were ushered to a small semi-enclosed area where the person who was to administer the shot was seated. She was very friendly. She requested a fan from someone in the section in front of us to help with her hot flashes. She turned on the fan, sat back, and gave a sigh of relief as the cool air enveloped her area.

"Second Shot?" she asked. "Yes," I said and proceeded with a long tirade about how excited I was. When I finished, she looked at me and remarked that she knew why I was so excited, removed the needle from its housing and inserted it into my forearm, pushed the plunger, removed the needle and it was over. Then she administered Llewellyn's shot. We said our goodbyes and were off to the observation room where we sat for about 10 minutes to wait for a possible reaction to the vaccine, which did not occur, so we got up and retraced our steps back to the car and drove home. Music from "Fiddler on the Roof" was playing on the car radio and it seemed to fit the occasion. "Sunrise, Sunset," "To Life." Yeah life, that's the thing, that's what it's all about.

At home we had some lunch, got back into the car and drove to Orchard Beach. We parked the car and proceeded to walk the path leading to the beach promenade, where we take our daily walk, weather permitting. We were both still on a kind of high, still tasting the flavor of just having completed our second CO-VID shot, and what that meant in terms of a return to a more normal life. There were some other beach walkers there and others sitting on the benches scattered over the promenade. We decided to walk to the east end of the promenade to liaison with the ducks and sea gulls in and above the water.

This spot brings us much closer to nature and we stand there and take in all the natural sights and sounds of the moment. On the way back we passed a couple sitting on a bench absorbing the sun's warmth. A need came over me and I walked over to the two complete strangers and abruptly said. "We just got our second COVID shot about an hour ago and I'm very excited about the new life that awaits us."

The couple stood up. The woman applauded; the man raised his arms toward the heavens and said "God bless you." I have had many occasions when I entered an interesting and sometimes personal conversation with a total stranger. Sometimes you can say things to a stranger that you would not say to one close to you. C'est La Vie.

On the final stretch of our walk we encountered another couple walking toward us and I repeated the cry of having had the second COVID shot and they too responded with big smiles, positive comments and good wishes. They seemed genuinely happy for us. We returned to the car and drove home, renewed by the sights, sounds and invigorating environment of Orchard Beach and its inhabitants.

In a way it was very liberating for us in light of Covid which has robbed us of some of our "freedom." The Rabbi, Cantor, and I told the story of Passover with help from our teachers. The teachers incorporated a great deal of dramatic play into their lessons for Passover so that the children understood the concept of what it meant to be a slave. It was one of the best ECC Passovers on record for us because we were all together.



HJC & HUMuS: Huntington Mobilization for Sustainability

here is a Jewish tradition that before writing your name in a book to show ownership, you write: "The earth belongs to God along with its bounty" (Psalm 24.) The purpose of this statement is to make clear that human ownership of anything is fleeting. At best, we can be stewards, caring for what we possess and that which we don't, until it passes to the next generation.

In February, we began as members of the inaugural class of the Huntington Greening Fellowship. Along with 23 of our peers, we learn from NY-based experts in environmental conservation how we can do more in our homes, our communities, and throughout the state to protect the environment. This initiative, funded through a UJA-Federation NY grant, includes participants representing at least eight Christian and Jewish congregations. The interfaith nature of this fellowship highlights that sustainability is a concern of all religions and that working together, across congregations, our impact on Huntington of today and tomorrow has the potential to be significant.

Yet, we are challenged, when the issues of sustainability are so vast and immediately pressing, where do we begin the process of creating change? For guidance we turn once again to Jewish tradition: "You are not obligated to complete the work, but neither are you free to desist from it" (Ethics of the Fathers 2:21). With this teaching in mind, we are inspired to begin the process of making environmentalism an issue of importance within HJC.

When something is important to HJC members, a committee of the board is formed to address that concern and to research and recommend concrete actions that the congregation can take in support of the committee's mission. As we begin the process of interweaving our learning with our desire for action, we call on you, our fellow congregants to join us by expressing your interest to serve on this committee as it forms. Please reach out to any of us to let us know the changes you wish to see

and to join this important committee.

What are some issues we might address together with congregations throughout Huntington in the short and long-term?

Limiting the use of disposables at congregational gatherings. We have learned that no matter the religion, fellowship/kiddush following prayer is where community and friendships are formed. Yet, these gatherings create unnecessary garbage, as plates, cups and plasticware fill our dumpster. Together with other congregations, we can explore sustainable fellowships that use washable dishes, or compostable ones.

Rewilding - HJC is blessed with a large property that includes lawns, multiple gardens and playgrounds. The grounds are well manicured and add beauty to our corner of Park Avenue. Rewilding asks: Can we achieve more with the space we have? Can we identify small areas of the property where species native to Long Island, ones that attract native butterflies and dragonflies, can be planted and maintained? This effort will strengthen our ecosystem and improve biodiversity.

Solar energy - The last decade has seen many advances in solar energy. Today's solar cells more effectively capture the sun's rays and convert them for immediate use, for storage, or for use as a commodity that is sold to PSEG. Together we can explore how alternatives to fossil fuels can lower our carbon footprint, save the congregation money, and align our values with our practices.

Through HUMuS, the three of us have connected with peers, people who share our values of faith and environmental responsibility. We have learned about environmental activism and how to support leaders who are already making meaningful changes in our region. And we have been inspired to positively impact our congregational community by becoming environmental stewards, working hand in hand with other faith communities. Won't you join us in greening HJC?


