Jewels of Rejuvenation

I'm writing this article prior to beginning a family vacation for a week and a half. When I return, the September "new year" will commence, a new year of school for our kids and a new year of shul with our HJC community. As with the onset of every new year, I'm curious to see what this year brings: What goals will be achieved?

What surprises lie in wait? I pray that the vacation I'm beginning with my family will be like gazing on a precious jewel, rejuvenating my mind with beauty, serenity, and peace that will help prepare me for the year ahead.

At the end of September the Jewish new year begins, and just as my vacation is supposed to help me physically and mentally rejuvenate for the "school and shul" year ahead, the month of Elul is supposed to help all of us spiritually prepare for the mystery and wonder of the Jewish year to come. To help our community in their spiritual preparation, HJC has a tradition of offering small booklets of wisdom called Jewels of Elul that are FREE and available for pick up in the Main Office. These jewels of inspiration remind us that each year we are called to strive towards godliness, to remain humble in our humanness, and help make the world into the beautiful precious jewel it



can become. Below you'll find a jewel from last year that inspired me, and as you read it I pray you will find the jewels that rejuvenate and inspire you as you approach the new year...

I've saved his voicemails over the years, each one sweeter than the last. "I love you Rachie. You are magnificent. I'm proud to be your dad."

My dad started an airline. For ten years, it was the fastest growing airline in the world. In 1982, he had a stroke, the

airline went bankrupt, he lost all of his wealth, and he was paralyzed for the rest of his life. Since then, hundreds of his employees continue to hold reunions at which they describe the rare environment of respect and teamwork he built. They revere and adore him. Meanwhile, in those remaining 40 years, he became pure love.

My son Eitan sat next to my dad's bed as he was dying. We were gathered for the last few days to say goodbye, and the grandkids had questions. Some asked for business advice, some for his favorite jokes. Eitan sat down quietly and, after a long silence, asked, "Poppop, do you have advice for how I should live my life?"

My father closed his eyes and opened them again.

"Respect people you don't know and love people you do."

That's it. That's how he lived. That's what he taught.

Thriving Congregation Assessment

As the High Holidays quickly approach, and as we look forward to a fresh start in the New Year, I would like to take this opportunity to let you know about an important effort here at HJC which has allowed us to be both introspective and forward thinking as a community. We have engaged in a process called the Thriving Congregation Assessment and it's in-

tention is to provide us with the forum to take a look at what we do well, what our strengths are, and how we can build upon those strengths. This is also an opportunity to take a look at our challenges and set goals for the coming year and years to come.

Our leadership has been working with Bob Leventhal, a consultant from USCJ (United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism), who has assisted and guided our process. Several months ago we started off with a survey which was sent out to every member household, in our ongoing effort to elicit everyone's thoughts and input. On Tuesday, July 26th we held the TCA Workshop program, and with over 50-60 participants, had an excellent turnout. The room buzzed with energetic brainstorming about who we are as a synagogue, who we would like to be, our goals and how we hope to fulfill these goals. The goals that emerged from the TCA survey to be further explored were Communication, Leadership Development, Caring Community, Welcoming and Engaging, Membership and Religious School Family Engagement.

The most successful and exciting part of the evening was the enthusiasm and engagement among us all. Everyone was happy to be there, happy to participate and happy to be a part of the process. Many, many thoughts and ideas were suggested and explored. Folks were happy to talk! As we gathered together in the social hall, everyone was encouraged to join a table and explore one issue in depth. Each leader of each of the six overall goals then created a list based on the discussions that ensued. Our next step is to convene a Steering Committee for the TCA, to prioritize and clarify, and then to hopefully actualize some of these ideas. This group will continue the process that the TCA Workshop started. We're looking for members, so, if you are interested in joining this exciting effort, please let us know!

Take a look at some of the innovative and exciting ideas that emerged at the Workshop:

Membership

- 1. Leverage local networks to actively market HJC in the community
- **2.** Develop, promote and offer musical opportunities- attract and invite the HJC and greater community
- 3. Strengthen connections between HJC and the ECC

Leadership Development

1. Create a system for mentoring new leaders by pairing them with someone experienced with an event or leadership

- 2. Broaden the nominating committee to include leadership development
- **3.** Develop a data base of skills and experiences of members
- Engage future leaders of the Jewish community by reaching out to college students and young adults

Communications/ Messaging/Brand

- Communication through social media, website- a) In-reachinform members how our programming and actions connect to our values b) Out-reach to potential new members, new to the community
- 2. Produce a video for the website, highlighting a Jewish/HJC value
- **3.** Improve communication to special interest groups- teens, ECC and RS families

Welcoming and Engaging Membership

- **1.** Board members reach out to connect with other congregants to ask what are your interests?
- 2. Develop a Leadership engagement system matching the heavily involved with those who are less so
- 3. Inclusion and diversity

Religious School/Engagement with Families

- Engage our wider congregation in the importance and value of our Religious School in our community. Bridge our congregants' talents with teaching opportunities and involvement
- **2.** Get input from ECC and RS families to determine desirable programming
- **3.** Create social opportunities for building meaningful relationships– nights out, movie night, etc.
- Increased personal contact from clergy/staff/leadership with families to help families feel valued

Fostering a Caring Community

- 1. Mentorship- connect HJC members of all ages with others
- Strengthen our own community by reaching out to the broader Huntington community through interfaith, education and volunteerism
- **3.** An "event exchange" with other faiths in Huntingtoneach faith experiences each other's holidays
- **4.** Offer increased support to all members in times of need, illness and grief.

There is no better time than now, as we look towards the High Holidays and the start of a New Year to re-energize and revitalize. As a Kehillah Kedoshah, a holy community, HJC continually strives to look within, and to utilize and build upon the multitude of strengths within our community.

I would like to express my sincere gratitude to each of you and all the members of our beloved congregation for always having the best interests of our Kehillah Kedoshah, our holy community at heart. The strength of HJC is in the strength of our relationships.

Torah Godly Play

Godly Play is a quiet moment of engagement that allows participants to hear the presence of God in a story. It is a highly spiritual method of telling stories about Jewish holidays and stories from the Torah. Torah Godly Play isn't about knowing a story, it's about finding a spiritual meaning. Together we sit in a circle and using simple, unadorned objects, I tell a story. For this evening's program, the story will be from Parsha Lech L'cha, the story of Abraham and Sarah. After the story, participants share in what they heard, what they experienced, and what they wonder about. Originally developed as a methodology for children, Torah Godly Play evokes the same engagement by adults. Participants are able to engage with Torah in a very different way than what they are accustomed to. Participants at all levels of Torah knowledge are readily engaged and each person finds their own meaning.





Deborah Cadel received training in Torah Godly Play from Rabbi Dr. Michael Shire of Hebrew College in Newton, MA. Based on a rich history of work by The Rev. Dr. Jerome Berryman on Godly Play, Torah Godly Play is a new approach to our Jewish stories. Debbie enjoys bringing this program to schools. She finds it continually rewarding to see how captivated participants are with it and by the wisdom they bring to their engagement.

Debbie has been working in the field of Jewish education for the past eleven years. In 2016 she was awarded the Grinspoon Award for Excellence in Jewish Education for the New York region. She has a Doctorate in Psychology.
