President's Perspective



About Me and My Family

Thank you for placing your trust and confidence in me and the 2023-2024 Officers and Trustees of the Huntington Jewish Center. I am both excited and a bit frightened at the prospect of assuming the presidency of HJC. This is certainly an exciting time for HJC as we fully emerge from the pandemic and welcome a new Rabbi. Our leadership team

is committed to ensuring a successful transition and introducing new and innovative programs. But we cannot do this without you. The Wall of Honor in our lobby quotes Moses Exodus 10:9 speaking to Pharoah. Moses asks to be allowed to go worship God. Pharoah responds that only the men may go. Moses then says: "With our young and with our old, we will go forward." This is exactly how HJC will continue to move forward.

Why, then, would I be frightened? Becoming president is a big responsibility. Like my predecessors before me, I am only human and will certainly make mistakes along the way. I also recognize that, given that we are a community of 280+ members with a diversity of opinions, it will not be possible for me to "please all of the people all of the time." I am open to constructive advice so if you are not happy with something, please let me know. But, also let me know if you like what I am doing!

Now, let me tell you a little about myself and my family. I retired about 2 and a half years ago after a successful and fulfilling 34-year career as an obstetric anesthesiologist at Stony Brook Medicine. Jay and I have been married for almost 42 years and we are now proud to be the first ever husband-wife team to be HJC presidents! We moved to Huntington in 1988 with Alex, then 3 years old and Ezra who was a newborn. We joined HJC right away and enrolled Alex in the Nursery School (that's what we called it in the old days!). Jonathan and Rina were born in Huntington. Our children all attended the HJC Nursery School and Summer Camp and Jonathan was even a counselor one summer! They all celebrated their B'nei Mitzvah at HJC and Alex, Ezra and Jonathan had their Aufrufs here as well. We have been blessed with a growing family over the years. Alex and Niaomi have added Winston, age 2 (who will be attending HJC Summer Camp this year), Ezra and Rebecca are newlyweds and Jonathan and Blair have added Russell, also 2 (he is older than Winston by one month). I grew up with a strong Jewish identity. Our family belonged to a Conservative synagogue in Plainview although we were not observant and I had little formal Jewish education. I credit Jay and HJC for creating the opportunities for me to become more Jewishly knowledgeable. We are regular Shabbat attendees and with practice, I am now quite comfortable with the Shabbat service. I try to prioritize continuing my Jewish education through reading and attending various classes and seminars. I particularly enjoy studying the weekly parasha and Divrei Torah from a variety of sources. In my free time, I enjoy walking almost every day, sometimes by myself and sometimes with friends. I do my best thinking during these walks. I also enjoy reading all kinds of books, cooking, baking and spending time with my family (especially my grandsons!) and friends. Of course, some of this "free" time will now be taken up by HJC business! But then, HJC is my extended family so it makes sense.

I have been blessed with a career that allowed me to witness the miracle of birth thousands upon thousands of times. This never became "routine" and I aways viewed each birth as unique and special. There were some urgent and emergent situations where I truly felt that God was at my side helping me make the right decisions. I am confident that God will continue to be a presence in my daily life as I embark upon the sacred work of serving my HJC community.

Of course, I will need human beings to roll up their sleeves and I am fortunate to have a wonderful Executive Committee dedicated to working collaboratively to advance the mission of HJC: Billy Wertheim, Andrea Smoller, Leigh Murphy, Ofer Rind, Rick Davis and Donna Fleiss.

I have three main goals for the upcoming year which all focus on engaging our membership. These include transforming HJC into more of a "community center", sort of like a mini JCC by expanding programming to include sports (more on this to follow), art classes, concerts and other social events. I want all our members to feel comfortable entering our building for activities that appeal to them. At the same time, we must remain true to our core values as a Conservative synagogue and promote the importance of Jewish Peoplehood and support of the State of Israel. My second goal is to develop the next generation of HJC leaders through mentorship with more "seasoned" leaders. An organization cannot survive and thrive without having a pipeline of new leaders. Third, I want to strengthen our committee structure by ensuring that all committees have strong chairs, active programming and sufficient manpower. Our HJC leadership team will work to enable the success of our committees.

If you have not yet participated in the life of our synagogue, now is the time. 
events or programs, work or various other obligations and yearn for the summer skies and sunny weather ahead.

We invited the parents to come this past Tuesday, May 23rd, to watch the children perform the Acts of Kindness finale. The entrance fee was any donation they felt comfortable making to the B+ Foundation. In fifteen minutes, this community raised over \$2,000! This is us; this is a community.

A Year in Review

For as many years as I have been working in Religious School settings, I am always amazed how quickly the end of the school year seems to roll around. Every year I ask myself if I have achieved my goals. Where did I excel? Where did I fall short? Are my parents happy? Are the children excited to come to school, are they learning, and how do we assess that knowledge?

Coming out of a 2-year COVID nightmare, it was important to make an effort to return to a state of normalcy and to model to our youth that life can and will go on. I am happy to say I really think we exceeded our expectations in this area. I was able to start a Reading Resource program to help strengthen those students who might have weakened as a COVID byproduct. We started a Religious School Pre-K class, a Rosh Chodesh group for girls, a Shevet Achim group for boys, brought in a Krav Maga class series, started a family tradition of Mitzvah Day, engaged over 100 people in building Jerusalem out of Legos, continued after school programming, blessed our pets, and conducted a family Tu b'Shevat Seder. Our Purim carnival returned, as did our B'nai Mitzvah workshops, school on Shabbat and of course snacks and bagels are back to being a regular staple here. Finally, the Religious School Parent Committee has been resurrected securing the future commitment of our Religious School.

They say it takes a village to raise a child. At HJC there is no exception. All these programs and celebrations would not be possible without support. I would like to thank my wonderful staff, Barbara Rosenfeld, Laurel Dorfman, Eileen Kerin, Rosalie Goldstein, Sonia Feiner, Sharone Gabay, Tara Kopman, Lea Feiner, my Aides Paula Kavanagh and Jeri McCabe and most of all Rabbi Saks whose support went way beyond the classroom. I am grateful to Leigh Murphy, whose guidance is invaluable, Rachel Gritz, Victor and Alex, who work tirelessly behind the scenes and our Sisterhood and Men's Club, and the Herskovitz Family Fund who are always there supporting the curriculum.

The biggest thank you goes to my HJC parents. I appreciate your commitment, involvement and for entrusting me with your children every week. I understand today's families juggle so much and life is very demanding. Thank you for making time for Jewish education in your children's busy schedules. It is an investment not only in their future but for generations to come. Wishing all my families a wonderful summer.


A Presentation and talk with Roy Schwartz


