From Rabbi Eric Rosin



Mar Heshvan

My colleagues who prepare for the Jewish holidays gracefully and well in advance insist that Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur are never early or late. Every year they report that the holidays have taken place precisely when they are supposed to. Because I don't prepare quite as gracefully, even in years like this one in which the holiday

season didn't begin until after we had entered the Month of October on the secular calendar, it still felt like they snuck up on me and I still could have used a couple more days to read over my sermons and contemplate the liturgy.

As a result of our living our lives based on two disparate calendars, the Hebrew calendar which is lunar and the secular calendar which is solar, we are stuck with this restless ritual schedule. Jewish holidays fall on the same date on the Hebrew calendar every year but they will never fall on the same day in our secular calendar two years in a row. Sometimes they don't even show up in the same month as they did the year before.

This year, November on the Gregorian calendar coincides almost exactly with the month of Heshvan, or Mar Heshvan on the Hebrew calendar. There are a number of explanations about how the month of Heshvan has acquired the sobriquet of "Mar Heshvan" or "Bitter Heshvan." Some say it is because we commemorate the flood which destroyed almost every living thing on earth during this month. The most popular explanation is that we call this month "Bitter Heshvan" because after a Hebrew month of Tishrei which was chock full of celebrations and observances, there are no holidays during the entire month.

Last month, we celebrated Rosh HaShanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, Sh'mini Atzeret and Simchat Torah. This month – nada, nothing. If we're lucky we have a friend with a significant birthday.

On the other hand, last month was exhausting. Every time we turned around there was another holiday. Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur involved so many hours or contemplation and prayer. Even Sukkot, which is also called zman simchateinu, the time of our rejoicing required a great deal of stamina, from the building of the sukkah, to waving the lulav and the etrog, the services and the shared meals. Simchat Torah

has the word for celebration, simchah, included in the title of the holiday, but it doesn't make reference to any sort of rest or relaxation.

Usually, when we announce the beginning of the month of Bitter Heshvan in the sanctuary on the Shabbat morning preceding the first of Heshvan, it is with a sigh of relief and touch of irony, because we're ready for a few weeks without a holiday after the frenetic pace that we've been maintaining.

This year feels different. Each of the holidays this year took place in the complicated context of the war in Israel, the hostages who have not yet been returned, the suffering that has engulfed the entire region, and the traumas which have not yet ended either in the Middle East or here where antisemitism has increased so disturbingly. As I write this there is a great deal of uncertainty about the outcome of the American elections. By the time you read this, that uncertainly will likely have been replaced by concern about the implications of the elections' results. This year, instead of leaning into a respite from the work of the holidays, we retain a palpable heaviness as we move into the month of Heshvan.

As we enter back into the routine rhythms of the year, instead of relaxing and leaving the work and the lessons of the holidays behind, this year we are called to carry them with us. Over the course of the Hebrew month of Tishrei, we contemplated how our tradition and our community have given us the tools we need to acknowledge our vulnerability, and to cultivate our resilience, to honor our obligations to face what is broken in the world and our responsibility to respond in the ways that will facilitate their repair.

As we move forward into the rest of the year, the joyful times when we gather for community dinners, Shabbat services, programs in the religious school and ECC, Men's Club and Sisterhood functions and all of the other events that take place will have more of a sense of purpose. My Mussar Practice Group and all of the other Adult Education offerings will be about more than intellectual edification, and the important work of our leadership will be to steward the resources of HJC so that it will be able to thoughtfully rise to the needs of our community during these difficult times and during the better times that we know will come.

The rabbis may have deemed this month a momentary lull on the Jewish calendar, but this year, it continues to be a call for us to come together as a community and to engage the world around us.

Early Childhood News



Constructive problem-solving. It's how children wrestle with life to make it meaningful. Susan Linn Contemporary American psychiatrist

Early Childhood Education is one of the most underestimated, undervalued and misunderstood professions. Many people see early childhood education as "babysitting" or think that it is about playing and having fun with children. While the latter is accurate, there is so much more to early childhood

education. We, as Early Childhood Educators lay the foundation for everything. And I mean everything. It is often the child's first experience in a group and classroom setting with other children. It is also generally the child's first time separating from their parent or caregiver. Those two statements alone are daunting enough. Imagine trying to engage and comfort a child who is struggling to separate from their parents, while trying to attend and keep all the other children in the classroom engaged and safe. Early childhood educators must nurture each child and allow them to begin to trust and bond with them. Then comes the socialization aspect of learn-

ing to cohabitate with up to sixteen other children depending on their age group. Many children have never had to share a toy, take turns, follow directions, or play and sit with a group, and a million other socialization skills. We are also responsible for social emotional development, which is to help children self-regulate and manage emotions, develop meaningful relationships with others, develop a self-concept, and more. We teach children life skills and foster self-esteem that encourage intrinsic reward through responsibility, while letting them know how competent and capable they are. This is all part of raising children who can handle adversity and problem solve, so that they are not helpless. We also focus on the development of fine and gross motor skills. Not to mention the unrealistic academic expectations that have been thrust upon 2-, 3-, and 4-year-olds. And of course, the absolutely daunting and heavy weight we carry on each of us in early childhood to keep the children safe. Now, if you add a thousand more responsibilities and expectations, you may fully understand and value the role of an early childhood educator.

Mitzvah Goreret Mitzvah (One mitzvah leads to another mitzvah) Pirkei Avot

As November approaches, the Religious School looks forward to planning our annual Mitzvah Day on Nov. 24th. It is a special time for the HJC community to come together and focus on giving back. The word "mitzvah," often translated as a "good deed," represents more than just a kind action; it reflects a sacred

obligation to make the world a better place through acts of kindness and charity.

The wisdom of teaching the concept of "Mitzvah goreret mitzvah" to our children, demonstrates that performing a single act of kindness often sparks a chain reaction, inspiring further acts of generosity and compassion. On Mitzvah Day, we embody this spirit of continuous giving, knowing that each small effort can lead to something greater, both in ourselves and in the world around us. This year we will be engaging our students and their families with a range of activities: JNN (Jewish Nutritional Network) under the supervision of HJC's Rob Fisher, Terri's Angels, providing the IDF with necessary supplies, creating Thanksgiving centerpieces for Carillon

Nursing Home in Huntington, assisting Mission Belly Full with blessing bags for the homeless and labeling food boxes, and finally, creating Hannukah cards for the Jewish Soldiers Project. We aim to instill in our children the importance of giving back and understanding the impact of their contributions. No act of kindness is too small, and through them, we see the continuation of a vital Jewish tradition. Acts of tzedakah, which they contribute to weekly, is a fundamental responsibility that comes with being part of a Jewish community. Mitzvah Day is just one example of our collective contribution to Tikkun Olam, the Jewish concept of "repairing the world."

The Mishnah reminds us that although we may not be able to solve all the world's problems, we do have the responsibility of doing what we can. Each small step we take brings us one step closer to a better world. It sounds idealistic because it is. Each family and individual bring their own unique contribution, creating a rippling effect of good deeds that extends far beyond our immediate actions. We take a break of the daily updates on war, election rhetoric, and hate, and focus on teaching our children the habits of kindness and generosity. In this way, we ensure that we leave the world a little better than we found it, not only for ourselves but for future generations.

COURAGE AND RESILIENCE: IRA KOHLER, LONE SOLDIER

In commemoration of the one year anniversary of the October 7 massacres, we had the honor of hosting a special presentation from Ira Kohler, a Lone Soldier who shared his powerful story of service in the Israeli Army during a time of war. When Ira, as a Long Island native, volunteered to serve in the IDF after college, he could not have imagined that he would find himself in the midst of the most brutal war in Israel's history. And yet, as his unit went to sleep on the night of October 6th in preparation for a simulated "war drill" which was to begin the next day, the soldiers were awakened and summoned to respond as the most babarbic acts of terrorism that country has ever seen were being carried out before their eyes.

As Ira told his story, those of us in the room sat breathless. Over that last year, we've heard many of the details. We've seen pictures. Some of us have traveled to Israel and visited the sites. Yet to hear first-hand from this tremendously articulate, young Long Islander was an overwhelming experience. To hear the details of what he and those in his unit endured, what they saw and heard, the close call of watching their helicopter explode as soon as the last of the 50 soldiers who were inside finished evacuating, the strategy of taking terrified people from their homes into safer places after convincing them that they were indeed the IDF and not terrorists who were knocking on their doors....

Ira finished his IDF service in March and has since devoted much of his time and energy to speaking engagements in the hopes that the facts of what happened in Israel will be heard and understood. Ira made it clear that in his speaking, he is not political and has no such agenda. He is merely telling HIS story, what he saw and experienced. One would hope that particularly as he speaks on some college campuses, that students will hear him and be inspired by him and his dedication, strength, and unwavering sense of duty to protect and defend our homeland Israel, even in the face of great adversity. One additional important note: as Ira spoke, his parents and grandmother sat in the audience and listened to him right along with us. One could not help but

wonder how they withstood those days, weeks and months while Ira's peacetime volunteer IDF service evolved into wartime service. As such, how does a parent of any soldier or any of the hostages survive the anguish of fearing and of not knowing when and if their loved ones will return??

Ira dedicates his speech to a fellow Lone Soldier who was injured, a fellow soldier who was killed, and to Omer Neutra, also a fellow Long Islander, who is still being held hostage.

We are grateful to Ira for his service to Israel and for sharing his time, thoughts, and heart with us.

May the New Year begin with an immediate return of all the remaining hostages to their loved ones and to peace in Israel and in the world.


